

COMMISSIONERS INSPECT THE COUNTY FARM Institution Declared in Good Shape

Revenue Producing Orchard is Proven in Excellent Condition. Officials Pay High Tribute to Don Chick's Management

The Los Angeles horticultural commissioners made a tour of inspection of the orchards of the county poor farm yesterday and it is believed their report will put an end to some adverse rumors which have been circulated regarding the condition of the trees.

One of the largest sources of revenue possessed by the farm is the orange crop. Two years ago it was said that the trees had been neglected and the scale had caused much damage to the orchards.

Orchard in Good Condition Twenty-six carloads of oranges, each containing an average of 380 boxes, have been shipped, and there will be about six or eight additional carloads of oranges to be shipped.

EXPERT DECLARES LETTER IS FAKE

Witness for Prosecution of Douglas Dawson Gives Evidence Favoring the Defense—Will Argue for Dismissal

After qualifying as a typewriter expert, C. L. King declared, when summoned as a witness in the Dawson case, the "conscience stricken" letter, introduced as evidence by the prosecution, was written by an experienced operator, who had endeavored to disguise his or her manipulation of the keys to make it appear to be the work of a novice.

Attorney Rogers said he would offer no more testimony, but will argue for a dismissal of the case, and it is believed Justice Frederickson will refuse to hold Dawson to the superior court.

Arguments will be made Tuesday morning, until which time the court adjourned. Rogers will argue for a dismissal on the ground of insufficiency of evidence.

The court announced that contempt proceedings will be taken up against Hartmann brothers at the end of the hearing.

King was asked by Rogers if he could imitate the letter in evidence. King replied he could, and after half an hour's work produced a very good copy of the letter.
