

COUNCIL TAKES UP FISTIC ORDINANCE REFERS CASE TO COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

Voters' League Spurs Lawmakers Into Action, Which, Prophets Say, Will Be Deferred a Month

The city council took up anti-prize fight legislation again and decided to let the committee of the whole start the ball rolling.

City hall prophets say action will be delayed a month, so that two more contests may be held before the law goes into effect; then a law regulating rather than prohibiting fighting will be enacted.

To head off tactics of the San Francisco fighters' trust which had planned to shift venue battles to Venice or Arcadia the Los Angeles solons will enact a measure cutting out referees and decisions—hence betting, too—and thus satisfy all elements.

The voters' league yesterday precipitated action by causing a resolution to be presented petitioning for an immediate enactment of a prize fight ordinance.

The resolution was as follows: "At the annual meeting of the Voters' league on April 25, 1907, the following resolution was adopted unanimously: "Resolved, That the Voters' league hereby respectfully petition the honor- able city council to enact immediately a proper ordinance to prevent in this city such brutal prize fights as have recently been a disgrace to legislators and officials who tolerated or connived at such flagrant violation of law and common decency."
