COUNCILMEN APPROVE GAMEWELL DEMANDS

Again yesterday the city council passed the demands which City Auditor Mudgett has refused to approve in connection with the \$3000 purchase for the fire alarm telegraph, made of the Gamewell Fire Alarm company.

The auditor holds that on all requisitions for supplies over \$500 bids should be advertised for, but as the Gamewell devices are patented the council failed to see the wisdom of advertising when only one bid was likely.

OPEN TRIDEUM AT CATHEDRAL

Feast of Sacred Heart Brings Forth Extraordinary Service of Worship—Father Conaty Will Celebrate High Mass

In honor of the feast of the Sacred Heart a trideum was opened yesterday at the Cathedral of St. Vibiana with a high mass at 8 o'clock, at which Rev. William Palmer was celebrant. Rev. Francis J. Conaty preached the sermon. Yesterday afternoon a service was held for the school children, at which Monsignor Fowler preached a sermon. Last night Rev. William Palmer preached.

The services will open at 8 o'clock this morning with a high mass, at which Father Conaty will be celebrant and Rev. J. M. W. Beaudry will preach the sermon. A service will be held for the children at 3 o'clock, followed by confessions, and the evening rosary and benediction will be held, which will also be followed by confessions.

Tomorrow, the feast of the Sacred Heart, a solemn high mass will be held at 8 o'clock, at which Monsignor Fowler will be celebrant, assisted by Revs. W. Palmer and J. McManus as deacon and sub-deacon respectively, and Father Beaudry as master of ceremonies. At 3 o'clock a service will be held for children, at which Father Ashe of Dallas, Tex., will preach the sermon. In the evening a service will be held, at which crosses and badges will be blessed and distributed. Monsignor Fowler will preach the sermon.

The League of the Sacred Heart, one of the parish organizations, will take a prominent part in the services. Rev. Joseph McManus is director of the league.

CREATE MORE BAKERY AND LUNCH INSPECTORS

Port Orange Railroad Arouses Interest

Heavy Sale of Property In Port Orange Townsite as Result

Not since the day when the Pacific Electric interests announced a broad-gauge line from Los Angeles to Santa Ana, has such popular enthusiasm been aroused in the territory immediately tributary to that thriving town as by the beginning of surveys and construction work for the projected Port Orange and Santa Ana Railway.

Townsmen and ranchers within an area of 100 square miles of fine agricultural country, of which Santa Ana is the nucleus, are nursing great hopes of a brilliant future for this territory. It is asserted that the new broad-gauge electric line will open up a rich country hitherto neglected in Southern California. Business activity is already beginning to feel the effects and a number of new enterprises are being projected.

The railroad and new free harbor will undoubtedly, it is said, prove an estimable benefit to the great farming country lying immediately south and tributary to Los Angeles. It will stimulate activity along all lines. The projected electric line, which is to be fully equipped for both freight and passenger service, will connect at Santa Ana with the Pacific Electric system and with the three transcontinental steam railroads.

Reports from the men identified with the building of the harbor and railroad are reassuring. The preliminary surveys in the channel, made by Drew Haven Dunn, prove the practicability of the harbor enterprise and the report contained such promise of an easy solution of Los Angeles' harbor difficulties that many manufacturing, business and warehouse interests are making a thorough investigation with a view of locating at Port Orange. It is understood that the Port Orange townsite project has inspired sufficient confidence among all classes of people to make certain the immediate growth of the town from a residential as well as a business standpoint. A large number of residence and business sites have been sold and the inquiries coming in daily afford the promoters a basis for making enthusiastic predictions.

WOULD PUT BAN ON SPITE FENCES

SEVENTH WARD OBJECTS TO THE OBSTRUCTION

Neighbors' Warfare Will Be Restricted by Council if City Attorney Can Find the Necessary Legal Authority

Councilman Henry Lyon asked the city council yesterday to pass a measure which would make it a misdemeanor in future to erect spite fences.

He declared that in the Seventh ward there were a number of flagrant cases of spite fences due to neighbors' wars, and while each side perhaps thought it was deeply aggrieved the public was the most heavily injured because of the hideous structures.

The measure was referred to the city attorney to learn whether such an ordinance could be passed and if so to prepare the proper phraseology.

The council's action yesterday was largely prompted through the action of Isadore B. Dockweiler, president of the library board, and Police Captain William H. Auble, on South Hope street, near Eighteenth, who tried in vain to prevent E. Dusec from erecting plastered wood double flats on the property lines, though every house in the block has a generous front garden.

Messrs. Dockweiler and Auble had appealed to the board of public works, health department, building department and the mayor in a vain effort to stop Dusec, but they could not check erection of the flats.

CAN NOW SELL THEIR STOCKS

Judge Monroe Dissolves Order Restraining Holders in Granite Brick Company from Disposing of Shares

Judge Monroe yesterday dissolved the temporary injunction that he granted a week ago, restraining M. O. Whelan, Charles A. King and F. E. Davis, directors of the United States Granite Press Brick company, from disposing of the stock of the company to a new concern, which had been organized for the purpose of the sale.

Before the transfer had been effected, D. Fisher and J. Bliss Dudley, president and secretary respectively of the old company, had been deposed, and their places filled by the election of Whelan and King.

When the injunction was secured it was with the understanding that neither side should attempt to gain control of the office and plant of the company until the case could be tried.

A meeting of all the stockholders, which had been called prior to the issuing of the restraining order, was not objected to by the court.

At this meeting all differences were smoothed over, and when the case was called yesterday attorneys for both parties were agreed that an amicable settlement had been made out of court.
