CHINESE EAGER TO SEE JURIES WORK

Have No Such Institutions in China and Will Take Chances for the Novel Experience

The state laws regarding medicine are causing the Chinese of Los Angeles much trouble. The state board of pharmacy is after them for selling opium without prescriptions and also for practicing medicine without a license.

In the cases now pending before Justice Rose the Chinese have all asked for jury trials. They seem to think they are not being treated rightly; also the jury is a new institution to them. They say they do not have such things in China and they like to see how it works.

Justice Rose has set dates for five cases. Tom She Bin, the most prominent of the Chinese, will be tried by jury June 13 for practicing without a license. Kung Yuen will have a jury trial June 26. He is charged with selling opium without prescriptions.

MOTOR OFFICER INJURED BY CAR

In Pursuing Speedy Automobillist Patrolman O'Brien is Rolled Under Trolley Trucks and Badly Bruised

W. E. O'Brien, formerly a well known baseball player of the Los Angeles team, narrowly escaped death while pursuing an automobilist on South Broadway yesterday afternoon. The auto was rolling at eighteen miles an hour when Motorcycle Patrolman Humphreys and O'Brien took after it. They pursued the machine to Sixth street, when O'Brien, who was ahead, ran in front of an eastbound Glendale car and was rolled under the trucks, narrowly escaping instant death. His machine was cut in two by the wheels of the car and O'Brien was badly bruised. The automobilist escaped.

CIVIC BODIES ARE ASKED FOR NAMES

REQUESTED TO SUBMIT LISTS FOR COMMISSIONERS

Attempt is Made to Divorce Good Roads Movement from Politics. Secretaryship to Be Plum

The Merchants and Manufacturers' association, the chamber of commerce and the Municipal league have been asked to take a hand in the good roads campaign.

The request comes from the Good Roads association, which asks that the organizations named submit a list of candidates to the county supervisors who are soon to appoint a new highway commissioner. The association already has submitted its list, but is anxious that politics do not enter into the selections, and hence is seeking to enlist the support of the semi-public organizations.

It is likely that the presidents of the three bodies will meet to discuss the matter and determine whether or not such action on the part of their respective organizations could serve any good purpose. In addition to the appointment of commissioners a secretary is to be appointed, and it is in this position that is regarded as the plum.

Commissioners will be paid \$5 a day for time actually expended in the county's service. The salary of the secretary has not been fixed, but may be \$200 monthly. The executive committee of the Good Roads association will meet Saturday afternoon, at which time an answer to the invitation extended is expected to be received.

DENY PERMIT TO MAKE GAS

INVENTOR OF GENERATOR STRIKES LEGAL SNAG

Fire Commissioners Regret Action, but City Attorney's Report is That No Other Course Exists

Because City Attorney Leslie Hewitt notified the fire board that it has no jurisdiction in granting permits for generating gas for fuel purposes the board was obliged to deny the application of C. L. Newby for a permit to install and operate a gas generating machine, making gas from gasoline, at 111 West Ninth street.

Newby explains that the permit is desired for testing and demonstrating the machines only, and that not more than one gallon of gasoline will be in the store at a time. One section of the fire ordinance provides that permits may be issued for fuel and power purposes only. Quoting this section the city attorney recommended: "The board of fire commissioners is authorized to grant special permits for the erection or maintenance or use of any device or apparatus for burning crude petroleum or any of its products for fuel purposes, or the use of any device or apparatus whereby gas is generated from crude petroleum or any of its products for the purpose of fuel or power, and not otherwise."

HEALY'S MAIL IS HEAVY NOWADAYS

Eighth Ward Councilman Who Would Punish Child-Hating Landlords Gets Praise and Condemnation

Councilman Bernard Healy, the friend of the heads of big families, is getting many letters these days commending him and execrating him for the ordinance he introduced which has for its object fining of landlords who refuse to rent rooms to families. "Hon. Bernard Healy, 'City Hall.' 'Dear Sir: You deserve the thanks of all right minded people for your attack on these abominations called apartments. How wonderful will tolerate dogs but she will move out if a child is brought on her floor. Give the devil his due; place the blame where it belongs. 'What does the soul of a woman weigh who introduces a dog and drives children away. Who calleth her husband a phonograph and worships some actor man's photograph? Non-scientists say—Drop a hint to us pray—If her soul on the scales were thrown What would it weigh?'"

A clipping from the Riverside Press also came to Mr. Healy from the issue of June 3, reading: "If Los Angeles succeeds in enforcing its proposed ordinance jailing landlords who refuse to rent houses because the would-be tenants have children, the city will establish a unique record among the municipalities of the country. 'And incidentally the councilman who introduced the ordinance ought to be sure of a life lease on his office unless the president hears about him and offers him a better job.'"
