

'CAPT. JINKS' DELIGHTFUL

BATHER FROTHY FITCH PLAY GIVEN FINE PRESENTATION

ETHEL BARRYMORE SHOWS DECIDED ADVANCE IN ABILITY

Atmosphere of a Generation Ago Admirably Preserved and Many Quaint Touches Make Comedy Happy Offering

Thirty-odd years—one generation—can make a huge change in affairs in this rapidly-moving United States of ours.

What youngster of today would suppose, for instance, that only a generation back—a time quite familiar to many present whose hair is not yet gray or gone—that hoopskirts and bustles were an essential portion of the attire of every modest woman?

Or, again, that "Champagne Charlie," "Tassels on Her Boots," "Up in a Balloon, Boys," or "Captain Jinks" supplied the position in the musical world now usurped by ragtime and the "coon" songs?

Or that street transportation was confined to horse cars—that "uptown" in New York was Fourteenth street—that transatlantic steamers were all sidewheel, paddlebox affairs—that Horace Greeley was running for president—that Los Angeles was a 'dobe pueblo'?

All this was thirty-odd years ago—after "the war"—the time wherein "Captain Jinks" is laid!

This, of course, has nothing to do with the play—save the odd costumes. It is merely recited that one may the better get into its atmosphere, for outside of its atmosphere it has few claims to wonderful merit.

Fitch has really caught this atmosphere, too—admirably. He has dramatized it, and about it has reared a slight but vital interesting fabric of play. His plot is not startling. Nor is his work overly enhanced with the usual frank, cynical, sneering smartness of up-to-date society which characterizes most of his writings.

The comedy was written for Miss Barrymore, and its great redeeming feature is that it keeps her a young maid instead of making her a middle-aged mother, as in "Alice-Sit-by-the-Fire," or an old hag of a charwoman, as in "The Silver Fox."

It tells of the adoration paid to the girl who, unnoticed at home, goes away and under a fictitious name becomes a prima donna, and of the attentions showered on her when she returns; of a boy made to win her, and her repudiation of her sporting suitor, only to take him in the end.

But there is plenty of whimsical character drawing, some rather clever hits at the popular conception of grand opera, a few tender love passages and the inevitable happy denouement. So that after all, it is not half bad.

Marie Trononi, Miss Barrymore's sister, who has been seen in the same play some few years back and is pleased to record a great advance in her art. She is fresh, winsome and she possesses a strong sense of humor, and in this rather trivial part, she endows it with a truthfulness that almost makes one believe it quite a possible reality.

Bruce McKay as Captain Jinks is effective and vivacious, George Pauncoff and Echin Gayer are good as his childish friends; Eugene Jepson is especially fine as the ballet master, and the smaller roles are well handled by the clever company. Especially do Effie Gorman as Mrs. Greenborough and George Swift as Pete deserve a good word.


