Mrs. Avery is the most prominent woman connected with the suffrage question today and she has made a life study of suffrage, going from country to country, talking with the people and their statesmen and studying the economic conditions. Her address will be most interesting as given by one of the broadest and best educated women living.

Mrs. Bain has lived in New Zealand for years and knows the country thoroughly. Women are further advanced in New Zealand than they are in any other country in the world, and she has watched the economic conditions closely to know all the vast improvements that have been wrought since their enfranchisement.
