COSTS \$200 TO SAVE CAT

SEALED UP FOR 48 HOURS, PUSSY IS RESCUED

HELD BETWEEN PARTITIONS IN SALOON

Black Feline Makes Its Presence Known by "Meows" and Mason Tears Down Walls and Releases It

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Sealed up for forty-eight hours in a hole in the cellar wall of Charles P. Kroll's saloon at 1213 Fulton street, Brooklyn, a black cat was released yesterday when a mason tore down a portion of the wall.

The masons tore down a portion of the building's cellar foundation and put in a new wall. That night, while a pinochle contest was on in a room in the rear of the saloon, the players were annoyed by the constant wailing of a cat.

Several players complained to Mr. Kroll, but he insisted that there was no cat in the building and that the noise must come from the back yard fence.

By putting the cats to the floor they came to the conclusion that pussy had been imprisoned under the floor.

Mr. Kroll was informed that it would cost him at least \$200 to repair the damage to the floor of the saloon and to the cellar wall.

Yesterday morning a mason demolished a large section of the newly constructed wall in the main building between the masonry and the wall of the adjoining building the cat was found.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Passengers on the steamship Teutonic witnessed a rescue at sea.

He was picked up in record time by a lifeboat in charge of First Officer Sumner.
