

WIFE GIVES UP HUSBAND

AGREES TO YIELD HIM TO ANOTHER WOMAN
WILL GO TO FRANCE AND GET A DIVORCE

Ferdinand Earle, Artist, Announces Marital Plan Which Includes Marriage to Young Woman Who Shares His Views

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—A remarkable story of a change in the marital relations of Ferdinand P. Earle, an artist, and son of the late General Ferdinand P. Earle, the hotel man, is published today, apparently on the authority of Mr. Earle himself.
The arrangement which Mr. Earle says has been decided upon includes the return to France of his wife, where it is planned she is to secure a divorce, and this accomplished, the wedding is to occur of Mr. Earle and a young woman, whose name is withheld, but who already is living with her brother in Mr. Earle's country home near Monroe, Orange county, New York.
A young son is to accompany the wife to France. The arrangement, strange to say, is apparently acquiesced in by all the persons involved.
Earle, in a lengthy published interview, says that he is acting on his own convictions.
He admits that his wife, a French woman, whom he married ten years ago, was very dear to him, but says that eventually trouble arose between them which he cannot explain. A few months ago, while traveling in Europe, he met the young woman he intends to make his wife. Like himself, he says she was a Socialist, and held the same views as he did, as to the happiness of wedded life. They became attached and realized that their marriage had been foreordained before their births.
Then the divorce was arranged. Earle insisted on calling in his wife, a dainty little woman, slim and pale, who confirmed this story.

SECOND RAISE IN WHOLESALE BEEF

HIGHER RATES EXPECTED AS SEASON ADVANCES
Price Goes Up a Quarter of a Cent.
Growth of Agriculture in Stock Country Named as Cause by Dealer
Hamburger steaks were all cut up yesterday when it was learned that the wholesale price of beef had been advanced a quarter of a cent. "At this rate," said a fresh one just out of the mill, "there won't be any trimmings, and we shall be outclassed."
It was the second raise within two weeks, and the opinion of the large dealers is that prices will advance still farther as the winter season gets nearer. Much of the beef for local consumption is brought to Los Angeles from Arizona and New Mexico, and for the last few months the local packers say the supply has largely exceeded the demand.
"Aspiring real estate dealers are also to blame to a certain extent," said the manager of a large wholesale house yesterday. "They have in many instances bought up large ranches in those two states and cut them up into farms."
"Grazing land that was worth only a few cents an acre is now held at as many dollars, and the one time beef raisers have retired in opulence."
He said, as those who heard the statement laughed, "I am speaking in all seriousness, though, of course, the subdividing of ranches into farm lands may not be the direct cause of the present boost of prices."
"As a matter of fact it is hard to tell what is responsible, for we do not get very much meat from the big packing companies in the east. My idea is that the cattle received these days is in excellent shape, and of course commands more on the market."


