While this celebration will be grand in every particular it will only be a faint echo to the great celebration that will take place in the capital of the Mexican republic on that greatest of Mexican feast days.

Several years ago I witnessed one of these mammoth celebrations in the City of Mexico, and like any liberty-loving American, was filled with enthusiasm at the incidents which led up to Mexico's independence were rehearsed.

Ninety-four years ago, on the night of the 15th of September, in the little town of Dolores, Mexico, the noble priest, Hidalgo, the father of Mexican independence, struck the first note of public revolt against Spanish oppression.

It is a little bell to have awakened a people from slavery, and the hand that first grasped the cord to send forth the call to arms against Spanish tyranny.

Is Birth of Diaz In the footsteps of the martyred Hidalgo followed another noble churchman, Morelos; and to both the "patriot priests," as she loves to call them, has Mexico inscribed her enduring gratitude.

The Mexican calendar is speckled all over with feast days and holidays, all observed with much gusto; but the crowning feat is given by common consent to the president's birthday.



MORE POLES MUST FALL

PUBLIC UTILITY COMPANIES ARE TOLD TO ACT AT ONCE ALL MUST COMPLY WITH NEW CONDUIT ORDINANCE

District Between Fifth and Ninth, Central and Figueroa Will Be Freed of Street Forests Under the Law

The board of public works served official notice yesterday on the public utility companies of Los Angeles that poles must come down in the conduit district between Fifth and Ninth street, Central and Hope street. This work is overdue since June.

The gas, electric, power, telephone and trolley companies are included in the list served with warning. The exact limits as defined by the conduit district as established by ordinance No. 13,784 approved by the council December 15, 1906, includes Fifth street from Hill to Olive, Sixth street from Hill to Figueroa, Fifth street from Central to Main, Grand avenue from Sixth to Ninth, Hope street from Sixth to Ninth and Flower from Sixth to Ninth streets.

The official notice reads: According to the provisions of the ordinance passed by the city council of Los Angeles of December 10, 1906, defining a district within which poles should be removed by public service companies and conduits substituted therefore, such work should have been completed by June 10, 1907.

No steps having been taken by you to comply with the ordinance on the streets hereinafter named, and the time limit prescribed for such work having terminated, you are hereby notified to remove without delay all poles and wires belonging to or used by you on the following streets:
