

TONG VICTIM SUCCUMBS

IDENTIFIES PRISONERS ON HIS DEATHBED

HOP SING MEN CHARGED WITH MURDER

Size of Police Squad in Quarter Leaves Parts of City Unprotected Is Complaint of Police

Lum Sing, the second of the men shot by gunfighters in the employe of the Hop Sing tong Friday night, died at the Clara Barton hospital yesterday afternoon shortly before 4 o'clock.

Before losing consciousness Sing identified Wong Chung, one of the men arrested Friday night as the man who fired the shots which cost his life and the life of Wong Goon Kor, and also identified Charlie Wing and Chan Cow Ling as the companions of Chung at the time of the shooting.

The three prisoners were taken to the bedside of the dying Chinese by Detectives Hosick, Craig and Talamantes. They were closely questioned before leaving the station, but all refused to make statements beyond denying knowing anything about the shooting.

"Yes, that man shot me," said Sing, raising on his elbow and pointing with trembling finger at Wong Chung. "Were these men with him at the time?" asked the officer pointing to the companions of Chung.

"Yes, both of the were with him," replied Sing, and dropped back unconscious on his cot. In thirty minutes he was dead.

Charges of murder were placed against the names of Chung and his companions.

Quarter Excited

The awakening of the tong war created much excitement in the local Chinese settlement. According to men who are familiar with the Chinese and their ways it is probable that the long war of murder and bloodshed before a final settlement is reached.

According to certain "tongmen" the fight Friday night can be traced directly to the methods followed by the police since the beginning of the tong war two months ago.

They say the police have shown favoritism, have failed to keep promises and have protected gambling games run by one tong while refusing to allow members of other tongs to play.

They say that old officers whom they could trust have been taken off their beats there and set to guard gambling games, while new officers, unknown to the Chinese and whom they refuse to trust, have been installed in their places.

According to the police the war was again started owing to a desire on the part of the members of the Hop Sing tong to obtain revenge for the murder of one of their members and the seriously wounding of another at the outbreak of the troubles. The police say the war will continue until the officers of the Six Companies take a hand in it and place a price on the head of any man found seeking to kill another Chinese. They also say the local chief of the tongs should be placed under such heavy bonds to keep the peace that they will fear to hatchet or gun men to do any killing.

Twenty-eight on Duty

Just what action will be taken by the police has not been decided. The old Chinatown squad of twenty-eight men under command of Sergeant Charlie Sebastian is patrolling the district and the old methods of searching every Chinese on the streets there are being followed again.

All the buildings in the district were searched yesterday and a number of boxes of cartridges, guns and knives were captured.

Last night it was feared that the war might again break-out at any moment. When this squad was first assigned to duty in Chinatown those familiar with conditions there said that immediately after it was withdrawn the war would be reopened.

On October 5 a meeting of representatives of the different tongs, with members of the police force and prominent Chinese merchants, met in the headquarters of the Hop Sing tong, where a peace agreement was signed and \$300 indemnity paid for the wounding of Chan Mon and Won Chuck at the outbreak of the troubles.

The police squad was then withdrawn and the officers said they were confident they would be no more troubled.

It is now claimed the alleged peace settlement was a farce gotten up by the Chinese so the police would be withdrawn and the war could start again.

If this was the purpose of the police were taken in, but it is said they will now be kept on duty until all chance of further outbreak is passed.

The fact that the heads of the police department find it necessary to keep such a large number of officers on duty in the district at all times makes it necessary to leave many sections of the city without protection, owing to the small number of men on the force.

Crooks Coming

With the winter season coming on when yegsmen and crooks of all descriptions make a practice of coming to Southern California, it is not surprising that they will be very unsatisfactory to the police. They say they will be unable to protect the residence section in a proper manner if the squad is kept on duty, unless the number of men on the force is increased without delay.

Patrolman O'Brien has been greatly commended by his superiors for the part he took in the rail Friday night. With several other officers he was on guard on Ferguson alley. His comrades left O'Brien to guard the front of the place while they searched the building.


While O'Brien was watching the place he saw two men sneak out from the side of the building. The patrolman drew his gun and shouted at them to halt. They began to run and the officer started in pursuit.

O'Brien gained on them until "Chinese Mary's" place near Los Angeles street was reached. The fugitives dodged in there but O'Brien followed them and succeeded in arresting both. When taken to the station they were found to be Wong Chung, the man identified as the slayer of Lum Sing and Wong Goon Kor, and Charlie Wing, identified as the man who was with him at the time he fired the shots.

MAGNIFICENT INSTRUMENT IN PASADENA

Lake Avenue Methodist Episcopal Pastor of Crown City Writes Commendatory Letter to Agents of Estey

"He who with a bold and skillful hand sweeps o'er The organ keys of some cathedral pile, Flooding with music vault, and nave, and aisle,

Though on his ears falls but a thunderous roar, In the compassed struts motive free Knows well that all the temple vast and dim Thrills to its base with anthem, psalm and hymn.

Tuned to the changeless law of harmony."

The poet "pipes his lay" to good effect. It is true, but unless the organ builder "lay his pipes" to goodly purpose the organist will have a sorry time of it.

Many an organist is fortunate that "on his ears falls but a thunderous roar"—if he could hear the effect in "all the temple vast and dim" he would quit in disgust, not that the player would be at fault, but what can one do with an instrument that refuses to respond to the moods of the musician, that is so constructed that artistic performance is impossible?

In Southern California there are many good organs, some are artists of almost national fame. But we are not so well favored with good organs, especially in our smaller churches.

Several of the most accomplished musicians hereabouts are laboring with antiquated instruments. I admire the patience of these men. Unless they were in love with their work, unless they were intensely earnest, many a console seat would be vacant.

Many New Instruments

It is with pleasure, however, that we find a gradual betterment of conditions. There is great activity among our church music committees at present, and several new organs have been installed and many others contracted for.

One of the new organs is that recently installed at the new Lake Avenue Methodist church, Pasadena. This fine instrument was supplied by the George J. Birkel company, 345-347 South Spring street, Los Angeles. It is one of the famous Estey pipe organs, built at Brattleboro, Vt.

This organ is built with all the well tested Estey patented features. It is an instrument that any musician would glory in. It is easy of response, resonant in tone, quick in action. Its effect is all that a critical audience desires.

The pastor of the church recently wrote the following appreciation of it: "Geo. J. Birkel Company, Gentlemen:

Design Beautiful

In exterior this organ is designed to accord with the woodwork of the church, hand carved in a modified mission style. The speaking pipes, which rise to an impressive height, are decorated with olive, cream and gold. Mission lighting fixtures add to the superb effect and are extremely practical besides.

Lack of space forbids me to enter into a detailed description of the organ's construction, but there is one feature I particularly want to mention. That is the Haskell patent register keys. This system does away with the antiquated draw stops, enabling the organist to change his stop combinations in about one-eighth of the time consumed when using the old draw stops.

The Haskell register keys consist of an abridged keyboard placed just above the manuals. The white key, which is not diminutive but of full width, when depressed brings into play the register of pipes or couplers indicated on its face, and its companion black key when depressed closes this register. This system is remarkable for simplicity and reliability.

LEASES NEW BUILDING TO ACCOMMODATE STOCK

Hub Clothing Company Buys Goods Representing Quarter of Million Dollars and Will Open New Quarters

For the purpose of accommodating an enormous clothing stock recently purchased in the east, A. L. Brown of the Hub Clothing company has leased the lower floor of the Bumiller building, 439 to 44 South Broadway, and has started a new establishment under the name of Hub store No. 2.

The entire made-up stock of three big eastern manufacturers is included in the new store.

According to Mr. Brown, on his return from Europe two months ago he discovered that the eastern wholesale clothing market was so demoralized that almost any consignment was made a large cash buyer. He bought three immense stocks, representing a quarter of a million dollars, being one of the largest single purchases of clothing ever made by any concern in the west. The opening of the new store will be announced in the near future.

AUTO AND CAR CRASH; DRIVER'S ESCAPE NARROW

Arcade Car Wrecks Oldsmobile Owned by C. W. Robinson at Sixth Street and Central Avenue

A single cylinder Oldsmobile owned by C. W. Robinson was smashed to bits in a collision with an auto and eastbound Arcade depot car at Sixth street and Central avenue shortly before noon yesterday. Mr. Robinson escaped death by a narrow margin.

The car was running at high speed. According to witnesses it did not stop when it neared Central avenue. When the motor man saw the approaching auto it was too late for him to stop, and the vehicles crashed together.

Mr. Robinson lives at 441 Central avenue and said last night he would sue the street car company for damages.

AWARD BIDS FOR CEMENT MACHINES

TEHACHAPI PLANT WILL SOON HAVE EQUIPMENT

Contracts Let by Board of Public Works for Over \$100,000 Worth of Machinery for Aqueduct Project

The board of public works yesterday awarded a number of bids for furnishing cement making machinery for the Los Angeles aqueduct.

The items and lucky bidders are: Schedule A—Rock crusher, rock chute and feeding device, clay chute and feeding device. Awarded to the Power & Mining Machinery company for \$2963.

Schedule B—Three 1 1/2-foot, two-tire kilns, two rotary dryers, three kiln feeders, three rotary coolers. Awarded to the Vulcar Iron works at \$36,385.

Schedule C—Six ball mills, with standard length shafts and bearings, \$26,640; twenty-seven feet p. (6 by 4 1/2) extra counter shafting at \$4,800; extra bearings, bed plate and grease cup (6 by 4 1/2), \$32,500—total for six ball mills, with additions, \$27,022.10. Awarded to Thomas Prosser & Son and Krupp & Co.

Schedule D—Eight tube mills, with standard length shafts and bearings, \$12,800; fifty-two feet (6 1/2 x 3) extra counter shafting at \$3,235; eight extra bearings, with bed plates at \$26.50, \$212—total, \$20,181. Awarded to Thomas Prosser & Son.

All bids were rejected for schedule D. No bids were received for schedules E, G and H and I.

Schedule J—Awarded to Allis-Chalmers company at \$2,853.

TROOP D OF THE FIRST ELECTS NEW COMMANDER

FIRST LIEUT GUNN IS MADE CAPTAIN

Retirement of Captain Watercus Left Vacancy Now Filled—Post of First Sergeant is Unoccupied

New officers for Troop D, First squadron, N. G. C., have been elected by the members of the troop and are now in active command. The election was necessitated by the resignation of Captain Watercus, former commander of the troop, who recently was compelled to sever his connection with the company owing to the press of private business.

First Lieutenant James Gunn of the troop was elected to succeed Captain Watercus, and Second Lieutenant McComas was elected to the place left vacant by the advancement of Lieutenant Gunn.

First Sergeant Louis Allison was elected to the office of second lieutenant. A new first sergeant was not appointed, but will be within a few days.

Major Charles H. Howland of the First brigade acted as presiding officer at the election.

Troop D is now in the best condition, both as regards finances and the class of its men as it has been at any time during its history.

There are forty-nine men on the roll at present and it is expected that several new recruits will be mustered in soon.

For some time past the members of the troop have been endeavoring to arrange matters so that horses could be purchased by them. The organization does not own the horses it uses when on parade or practice marches, but is compelled to hire them from a livery stable. They feel confident the efficiency of the troop could be greatly increased if it owned its horses, and if matters turn out as expected it is probable they will succeed in procuring them before next summer.

LYON'S EFFORTS BRING RAILS TO STREET LEVEL

Team Owners' Complaints About Steel Being Laid So High as to Form Obstruction Will Be Remedied

Councilman Henry Lyon and Los Angeles railway officials held conferences yesterday as a result of which the company will put its construction force to work as rapidly as possible lowering the rails on Seventh street.

As at present laid they constitute a menace to wagons and drivers, as they are above the grade.

Repeated complaints have been made at teamsters' and drivers' headquarters as well as to the Team Owners' association that these tracks cause a hardship, as many wagons are unweeled by contact with the rails.

It is thought that the trouble will be done away with soon, Mr. Lyon having laid the question before the council.

CLEAN CITY, SAYS MAYOR

LOS ANGELES FALLS IN LINE WITH THE NORTH

AWAY WITH GARBAGE, FILTH AND RODENTS

Mayor, Council, Health Officials and Police Will Inaugurate Campaign for Cleanliness, Volunteer Physicians Assisting

This will be house cleaning week for Los Angeles. The mayor, council, the health board, police department and state board of health have so decided.

By concerted work it is hoped that not only will the city be cleaned of filth—a cleaning which is customary in all large cities at least once a year—but all the rats and mice possible will be exterminated as far as traps, poison and other means can rid the city of these rodents.

Mayor Harper yesterday morning called a special conference of the council and board of health. Dr. N. K. Foster of Sacramento, secretary of the state board of health, also attending.

Following the examples of San Francisco, Oakland, San Jose, Sacramento and other points it was decided that this is the best time to inaugurate a general cleaning up and the necessary orders were issued.

Physicians Will Help

A plan was broached and adopted by which each ward is subdivided, volunteer physicians will assist the sanitary inspectors in finding places where official attention is needed and the entire police force will second these efforts.

Los Angeles must be made the cleanest of cities—as it is the fairest—that is the order.

Any one who fails to carry out instructions will be prosecuted promptly, as the campaign will be swift, thorough and effective.

Business men who have suggested this idea are of the opinion that a few thousand dollars spent in preventive measures will save hundreds of thousands of dollars later.

Police on the Alert

The police will pay special attention to any one hereafter caught throwing rubbish into vacant lots and behind bill boards, depositing garbage in open cans—all garbage must be securely covered in metal receptacles—and in any way littering the streets, alleys or other areas.

Meanwhile Mayor Harper has decided to hold up the salary ordinance of the health department recently passed by the council, as its execution would have cut the department's force down by seven men at a time when the question of increasing the number of inspectors seems probable.

MOTORCYCLIST IN MAD DASH RIDES DOWN GIRL

Miss Mary Johnson Suffers Serious Injuries When Machine Knocks Her Down at Third and Hill

Miss Mary Johnson, 554 South Figueroa street, was seriously injured yesterday afternoon when an unidentified man riding a motorcycle ran into her at Third and Hill streets.

The young woman was taken to the offices of the Y. W. C. A. and a physician was called. It was found her right arm had been broken in two places and she had, otherwise suffered serious injury.

After she had been attended she was taken to her home.
