

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE IS DISCUSSED

RELIGIOUS PHASE BROUGHT FORWARD

MEN PROMINENT IN CHURCH WRITE STATEMENTS

Striking Illustrations of Intolerance Are Given—Inconsistent Position of Some Eastern Legislators Is Shown

Christian Science, as a means of physical healing, is more generally known and appreciated by those who know but little about it than its religion. But to those who believe in and strive to practice it the religious teachings it inculcates are the vital things. To them, the spiritual understanding it brings, the better understanding of the Bible, of God and of man's true relation to him and to the laws of the universe are the essence of Christian Science and the physical healing only the demonstration or proof of the truth of the Christian Science religion or the "works following." Therefore, let us lay aside the question of the healing, through the practice of the Christian Science, and consider it briefly as a religion.

It may be said, in the beginning, that Christian Science is not a new religion. It differs from the so-called orthodox churches not so much in what they receive as in the essentials or fundamentals of the Christian religion as it does in the construction and application of them to the everyday life of man and his future state.

Their Beliefs Christian Scientists believe in the Bible, in the omnipresence, omnipotence and omniscience of God, in the immaculate conception of Jesus, his crucifixion, resurrection and spiritual ascension. They believe in his religious teachings, in their faith and in striving to obey his command to preach the gospel and heal the sick and to have "that mind which was in Christ." They believe in the atonement, not in the sense that man was released from sin by Jesus suffering and death on the cross, but in the sense that his life and death and his resurrection in the flesh and his ascension in the spirit were intended to demonstrate the omnipotence of God, the mortality of the fleshly body and the immortality of the spiritual; not in the sense that his suffering and final crucifixion could or was intended to shield man from the punishment that must surely follow sin, but were to show man the way to eternal life, to that perfection which he commanded when he said: "Be ye perfect even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect."

The religion of the Christian Scientist is the religion of Jesus as he understands it and as Jesus taught and demonstrated it. His was a religion not alone of words but of works. It included not only the preaching of the gospel but the healing of the sick. Mrs. Eddy has never claimed to have discovered a new religion, but she has discovered the true principle of the religion of Jesus that has for centuries been lost and displaced by man-made creeds and dogmas.

Lives Regenerated That she has by her discovery opened up the spiritual meaning of the Bible and made practical here and now the teaching of Jesus is attested by the regenerated lives of thousands of men and women who have thereby been made to see in religion not a dead ceremony; in life not a preparation for death but a growth into eternal life and perfection; and man, as God's child, created in his image and likeness; not material but spiritual; and sin, evil, sickness and disease, not as real and permanent, but as unreal and temporal, and in God the All in All, and that all as good overcoming and destroying all evil and discord of every nature; and this omnipotent principle of good as always and everywhere present as the "refuge and fortress" of many, and his sure protection against all evil, if only man will keep his commandments in thought and deed.

Therefore Christian Scientists believe that the way to salvation, the enjoyment of life harmonious and eternal is through right living and right thinking, by putting off the old man and putting on the new, by repentance and reformation. In other words, that the divine law is fixed and unalterable, the man attains to salvation and immortality, to freedom from the belief in evil and sin and spiritual understanding by conforming himself to that law. They believe that every man must work out his own salvation in the way pointed out by Jesus, the Christ, and that he can attain it in no other way. To sum up, the Christian Science religion is a religion of right thinking and right living as the Master taught us how to think and how to live. The text of the Bible and Health, with Key to the Scriptures, by the founder and leader of Christian Science, Mrs. Eddy, is a commentary on the Bible, not to refute or deny its truth but to ascertain and point out its true spiritual meaning and import.

Interest Is Awakened Through its teachings thousands have been brought to study the Bible with new and awakened interest and with an understanding never before attained, to their immeasurable advancement, physically and spiritually. It has increased their respect and reverence for the Bible and their love for God and their fellow man. It has made the Christian religion a living, pulsating power for good, in the elevation and regeneration of man. It has brought harmony good cheer and love into thousands of families where before were discord, inharmonious and strife. It has elevated the standard of business honesty and integrity, civic obligations and brotherly love.

It is at all wonderful that such a church, with such a religion, is bringing to its ranks all classes of people, the rich and poor, the unbeliever and the believer, the educated and uneducated, young and old alike? Is it wonderful that they are coming by hundreds from the old churches to find a live practical, working, everyday religion that meets their needs in every way and teaches them that heaven is reached by true and right living and not by dying? ANALYZES INTOLERANCE OF CUSTOM IN THE EAST

A striking illustration of the intolerance of custom was manifested in the verdict of a New Jersey jury who recently found guilty the parents of their child, who died under Christian Science treatment. Suppose this course were pursued in similar cases lost under material medical treatment. It is self-evident that the business of courts and juries would be immensely increased. It is said that in the city of New York there is a death from pneumonia every sixty minutes. This item alone would give the court twenty-four new jury cases each day. Occasionally and at long intervals, a case of pneumonia is lost under Christian Science and it is heralded throughout the land with headlines, and the physicians are quoted as saying that the case would have been saved under medical treatment. In this connection it will be interesting

to note the remarks of Dr. William Osler, an English professor of medicine at Oxford University, and commonly recognized as one of the highest authorities in the medical profession, who says in his "Text Book of the Theory and Practice of Medicine":

Damaged by Drugging "Pneumonia is a self-limited disease which can neither be aborted nor cut short by any known means at our command. There are no specific remedies for pneumonia. The young practitioner may bear in mind that patients are more often damaged than helped by the promiscuous drugging which is still only too prevalent."

The following statistics compiled by V. O. Strickler, committee on publication for the state of New York, will prove interesting. Mr. Strickler writes as follows:

"There are many different schools of medicine that are antagonistic to one another, and in any one of them could guarantee cures there would be no need to pass laws to compel the people to employ doctors of that school. Neither would it be necessary to resort to coroners' inquests or other devices to intimidate people from employing some other school."

Since no school of medicine is able to cure all cases, the public is interested to find out the best system and the one able to produce the largest percentage of cures. Christian Science does not claim at this time to cure every case, but it does claim to cure a larger percentage of cases than any other known curative system.

Some Statistics

The public cannot fail to be interested in the results of Christian Science practice in the state of New York. There are not a few instances of the state who rely wholly upon Christian Science treatment for sickness. It is probable that the number exceeds this figure. Since the 1st of January, 1907, there have been less than ten deaths in the entire state under Christian Science treatment. Whenever one occurs it always gets into the papers and there is usually a coroner's inquest. The average annual death rate in the state of New York for the year 1906 was over 8 per 1000 inhabitants, while among the Christian Science population the death rate thus far this year has been an average of .1 in each 1000.

During the year from September, 1905, to September, 1906, there were thirty-three deaths in the state of New York under Christian Science treatment. Almost one-third of this number were cases that turned to Christian Science in the last extremity, after the patients had been given up to die by the doctors. It will therefore be seen that the average death rate for the year among the Christian Science population, even including those who were not Christian Scientists and who only turned to it after the doctors had given them up, was only .04 to .05 as against the average death rate of over 1900 inhabitants for the entire state.

These figures are most portentous, and in them can be found the reason why Christian Scientists and many others who have turned to it themselves with the Christian Science church have more faith in Christian Science than they have in any other system.

JUDICIARY SWAMPED

IS HOLIDAY RESULT Judges and Clerks Grow Restless at Sight of Unfinished Business Daily Accumulating During Enforced Idleness

Judges and clerks in the courts which have been closed by the legal holidays are growing restless as they see the volume of business piling up before them. In the courts of the city the volume of business has increased so that the courts had more cases than they could try, but with the loss of nearly a week they are now faced with a stack of unfinished business which will almost swamp the judiciary. Not only the courts but attorneys and litigants are growing anxious and impatient. Superior court judges who were around the court house yesterday unanimously expressed a hope that Monday would see the end of the legal holidays.

Trains have been held to within half a mile of Azusa, and the force is expecting to finish the line within the time limit easily.


The new offices of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy in the Linsler building, 525 South Spring street, were occupied yesterday.

JAPS AGOG OVER RAIDS

BANQUET DISTURBED WAS IN MIKADO'S HONOR ILLEGAL LIQUOR SELLERS PLEAD GUILTY

Two "Blind Pig" Proprietors Fail to Appear and Warrants Are Issued. Police Headquarters Well Stocked

The Japanese of the Pacific coast have thrown into a furor by the descent of the Los Angeles police during Friday night's raids upon a banquet being given in celebration of the mikado's birthday.

In a private restaurant at 419 Wilmington street a banquet was in full swing. The whole party was arrested. Just as several dancing girls withdrew the police arrived and confiscated all the drinkables.

Police Justice Austin's court was filled yesterday morning by "blind pig" keepers and their friends.

Of the thirty-one arrested twenty-nine appeared in court. Eighteen pleaded guilty and paid fines of \$25 each. Eleven changed a plea of not guilty to guilty and paid the same amount. Two failed to appear and warrants were issued for their arrest.

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Ford said it was the purpose of his office to see that the Japanese obeyed the law.

Vacant spots around the police station are still occupied by the liquor confiscated. In the sergeant's office, the property room and the stable are piles of boxes of bottled goods. The presence of the liquor provokes much jealousy and when Wesley Hinkle, the colored stableman, whose barn is overflowing with case goods, was asked how he liked it, he said: "I'd rather be inside looking out than outside looking in."

RAILROADS MAKE A LO W RATE FOR OPERA PATRONS

Round Trip Will Cost Fare and a Third During the Week of Fritzi Scheff's Engagement

Arrangements have been made with the Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and Salt Lake routes to run excursions from all Southern California points into Los Angeles during the engagement of Fritzi Scheff at the Mason opera house in "Mlle. Modiste," and it is expected that numbers of people from out of town points will take advantage of the low railroad rate to witness her performance.

A round trip rate of a fare and one-third will be made from San Diego and intervening points into Los Angeles, good leaving such points on Friday or Saturday, November 15 or 16, and good returning until Monday, November 18. The same arrangement has been concluded from points as far east as Riverside, San Bernardino and Redlands, the excursion tickets being good also on Friday or Saturday and returning until Monday.

NATIONAL CLEARING HOUSE IS NEEDED

BANKER SAYS UNITED STATES IS ENORMOUSLY RICH

Tells City Club That Congressmen Should Put Their Heads Together and Help Country Out of Dilemma

President J. M. Elliott of the First National bank, in addressing the City club yesterday on the financial situation, advocated a national clearing house which would serve as a check on bad banking. Mr. Elliott said he favors referring to this national body all cases of misconduct or speculative tendencies on the part of bankers so that they would be punished if they endangered banking by their practices. The attendance at the meeting was large, for the membership of the club now numbers 275. Mr. Elliott said that clearing house certificates were now in use in all large cities, they being primarily promissory notes, the recipient banks depositing securities with the clearing house and borrowing upon their credit to the extent of 75 per cent.

Funds Held East The issuance of these certificates was made necessary, it was explained, because when it is seen that a state is made to belong to Los Angeles banks could not be had at present, and thus the system was put in practice simultaneously in all large cities.

By strict action, treating all customers alike and husbanding their resources, the Los Angeles banks could help the great family of American banks over a trouble which will be but temporary.

"I hope to live to see the day," he said, "when the Clearing House associations of the United States will be stronger than they are at present."

"It has been a hobby with me that the time will come when they will scrutinize men going into the banking business and when it is seen that a state is made to do business in an unsafe way that the Clearing House association will tell those men: 'Unless you do your business in a way that will warrant us in saying that it is safe we will not endorse you, and no clearing house bank in the United States will take your paper.'

"If that is done these panics will not be likely to occur."

Blames Small Minority "The best element of the banking men in the United States has done its best to avoid something of this kind, but egged on by a small minority it and a lot of its influence is bearing the burden."

"I have been asked how long this thing is likely to continue. I can merely say that when it happened before it took two or three months before the clearing house was organized and a flood of money has got to come back to pay for it."

"We are unfortunate in having laws that permit of its elasticity. In Canada they are better off. The situation can be relieved there, but we cannot do that. Congress, from time to time, has seemed as if it was about to take some financial step to remedy this situation."

"I hope that this trouble will be a lesson to the congressmen. They should put their heads together and arrange something that will help the United States, rich and powerful a nation as it is, out of the condition in which it finds itself at present."

"If it could be arranged at once, machinery should be put in motion to relieve credit, which seems to be crippled temporarily. As I say, it required two or three months before to get these things in ordinary shape."

"Other than this to be said: This country at the present day is enormously rich, it is inclined to be a little extravagant, but it is well able to afford it. The wealth is spread over a wide area and in the pockets of a large number of people."

"Look at Kansas, where for several years farmers mortgaged their homes. Now they have money to loan. Cotton is bringing good prices, and other commodities, but these commodities have got to go out of the country and a flood of money has got to come back to pay for it."

"I think we have been extravagant and we must stop being extravagant."
