

CARMAN TO SHIP GOOD ONES HERE WILL RACE PICK OF STRING AT SANTA ANITA

Meelick and Rapid Water to appear Saturday. Uncle, \$30,000 Colt, May Also Be Here and Sport Hildreth's Colors.

Meelick and Rapid Water will be shipped by Sam Hildreth from Oakland and will sport his colors at Santa Anita.

Horsemen are setting down their steeds in preparation for the opening handicap and many an owner whose horse are eligible to start is looking forward to the first race on Monday.

John Walker sent out J. J. Walsh's Marster and Sir Edward yesterday morning and they stepped the mile in 1:44, which is a clever performance.

Other fast works were Critic, which recited off six furlongs in 1:16. Jim Boden sent out Layman's boy, Black Master, five furlongs in 1:32-5.

Besides training a large stable Jim Boden will look after Jockey Dave Englander's mounts. The boy rode with much success in the east last summer.

There is considerable speculation among the horsemen at Santa Anita park as to the weights to be carried by the horses in the Santa Anita handicap.

Subsequently a team was recruited from the special purpose of playing Carlisle. This game was played in the presence of about 60,000 persons, who came in special trains from all parts of the state to witness the defeat of the all-California team with a score of 22 to 0."

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ENGLISH ARE POOR LOSERS

LONDON PAPERS SET UP THEIR CHARACTERISTIC WAIL
Unsportsmanlike Britons Hoot Tommy Burns at Close of Fight With Moir, Though Gunner Was Rotten

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Although giving him all the credit for beating Gunner Moir in the heavyweight battle in London last night the English press is not well pleased with the victory won by Tommy Burns, according to the extracts from the English papers cabled here early this morning.

Didn't Turn a Hair
That Burns had all the best of the fight from the beginning is admitted by the Sportsman, which says that Moir was badly used up, while "Burns, on the other hand, had not turned a hair, and not only left off without a mark, but even the parting of his hair was not disarranged."

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
