The way long shots poured in on the first three races was certainly one large upset. Grindstone took the first with as good as 60 to 1 against his chances.

There was only one purse race on the card, and this Edwin T. Fryer picked out as a plum for Wallhauser, trimming Earl Rogers and Joe's Jewel for the big end of the money.

Billy McKinney's first good thing of the season turned up in East End, which was played to a farewell by McKinney and his friends.

Waterbury was the bona fide favorite of the day, and helped regain some of the change the Carman bunch lost on Silberschwanz.

With Guy Burns in the saddle, Progress was made favorite over the ten platers opposed to him in the second race, and went out to run the seven-furlong course well backed.

PRICE SCORES IN SECOND. Burns went right on to set the pace with Progress, and at the first calling station was four lengths ahead of the Sultan.

ADORATION, LEFT AT POST, RUNS EXCEPTIONAL RACE. Another story than Edwin T. Fryer's victory in the third might have been recorded if Adoration, post time favorite over Earl Rogers and seven others, had been sent away from the barrier with her field.
