

15,000 SIGN INTERMENT PETITION

WANT NO RESTRICTIONS ON TWO CEMETERIES

TRUST FUNDS PROTECT ROSEDALE AND EVERGREEN

Determined Effort to Assert Present Rights of Lot Holders to Continued Burial in City Limits

With nearly 15,000 signatures attached, a petition was filed with City Clerk Harry Leland yesterday on behalf of Rosedale and Evergreen cemeteries, asking the city council not to take away present rights to the continued use of these two cemeteries.

The cemetery restriction question will come up for a hearing on Monday, and both sides of the question will be strongly represented in the city hall. The lot owners have retained former City Attorney Herbert J. Goudge as counsel.

The petitions say briefly:

We, the undersigned residents of Los Angeles, earnestly request that your honorable body do not adopt any ordinance designed to prevent the further use of Rosedale and Evergreen cemeteries.

The suggestion that no new cemetery be established and that no extension be made of existing cemeteries is one which we are content to leave entirely to the decision of the city council, but we protest against any attempt to take away present rights to the continued use of the cemeteries referred to.

Rosedale and Evergreen cemeteries are protected by trust funds which insure their perpetuity. They are good property, free from any unsuitable conditions of the suburb and the reports of the health department show that no sanitary reasons exist for any interference with them.

They are not and cannot become a detriment to public health; and to close them at this time would inflict a wholly unnecessary injury to the feelings and interests of a very large number of the residents of this city.

The petitions say briefly: We, the undersigned residents of Los Angeles, earnestly request that your honorable body do not adopt any ordinance designed to prevent the further use of Rosedale and Evergreen cemeteries.

The suggestion that no new cemetery be established and that no extension be made of existing cemeteries is one which we are content to leave entirely to the decision of the city council, but we protest against any attempt to take away present rights to the continued use of the cemeteries referred to.

FIND BODY IN WILDS OF TEMESCAL

NO CLEW TO IDENTITY OF MAN

Picnickers Make Discovery—If Murder Was Done, Crime Is Cleverest in the Annals of Southern California

SANTA MONICA, Dec. 14.—In wild Temescal canyon, within a stone's throw of where the bullet pierced the body of Mrs. Claude Isedell was found sixteen months ago, the decomposed remains of a man, every clue to whose identity appears to have been destroyed, was discovered today by F. J. Rarick, a former Santa Monica policeman. If the man was murdered the crime is one of the cleverest known to Southern California authorities.

Rarick had entered the canyon at the head of a picnic party that included his wife, C. I. Rarick, his brother, and wife and Miss Rose Donahue, and almost reached the top of the ascent when he stumbled over the corpse, which was partly hidden under foliage. There was nothing repulsive in the appearance of the body, which lay stretched out fully dressed, the skull alone being visible from beneath a remnant of material that proved to have been a gray fetora hat.

Chief of Police Barretto was at once notified of the find and accompanied a wagon from Bresse Brothers' yard, undertakers, into the canyon to get the body.

Near the remains a medicine bottle that appears to have borne a strychnine label was picked up. An examination of the clothing of the man disclosed that the laundry marks on his collar and cuffs had been carefully cut away and that the inside of his coat collar had been mutilated to remove the label of the makers. A cheap nickel watch and a handkerchief were on the body.

Mr. Bresse stated to the police that the corpse had probably lain in the canyon three months. No marks of violence were discovered.

Remains of George Nash, the Calabasas rancher, for whose whereabouts a search has been kept up since his disappearance, have been sent for.

The body is that of a smooth shaven man about 5 feet 9 inches in height, who weighed probably 150 pounds. The clothing comprised a suit of gray material, medium weight outer underwear, blue knocks, gray outer shirt and black laced shoes. The man wore linen collar and cuffs and a black tie with red stripes.
