

FORAKER'S MEN OPPOSE TAFT TICKET

RIVAL COUNTY COMMITTEE IS NAMED

Police Attend Convention, Anticipating Clash Between Followers of Secretary of War and Ohio Senator

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 11.—The first strike of the Foraker followers here was made today, when in a mass meeting a committee was selected to displace the "regular" Republican county executive committee.

The question of the legality of the committee selected as against the "regular" committee, said by the Forakerites to be a Taft organization, will not be placed in the hands of the county board of elections. The claims of the so-called Roosevelt committee, a third element in the local situation, also rests in the same situation.

It will be the duty of the board to determine which committee is lawful and of authority to act for the party in this county.

To place the issue squarely before the board each committee has issued a call for Republican primaries, all on the same date, February 11.

The board has until next Wednesday to decide upon the merits of each claimant.

Many policemen were on duty today in the convention hall in anticipation of an encounter between the Forakerites and the followers of Taft, who early announced their intention of packing the convention, but it was as quiet as a Sunday school convention and everything went through unannouncedly and without a hitch.

Resolutions condemning the "regular" committee and one-man power in the party were adopted.

At the proposed primaries delegates to the state and national conventions will be chosen.

PROBE DISAPPEARANCE OF ROYAL REGALIA

Commission Disposed to Drop Proceedings at Dublin, but Governor Insists That Hearing Be Continued

DUBLIN, Jan. 11.—The inquiry by a vice royal commission into the disappearance of the regalia of the order of St. Patrick was resumed here today.

Neither Sir Arthur Edward Vicars nor his legal representatives were present. The members of the commission are inclined to let the proceedings drop, and they so informed the general secretary, clearing that in their opinion no useful purpose could be served by proceeding without the information that Sir Arthur could give.

The solicitor general, however, declared that the governor wished the inquiry to continue and said he was in a position to bring witnesses who could give important testimony.

SURGEON LEAVES RUBBER TUBING IN PATIENT'S CHEST

RED LODGE, Mont., Jan. 11.—A local surgeon, who has performed an operation on Charles Joakinen, a young Finnish miner, for the removal of the cause of pain in his chest, found in the cavity left by a previous operation two pieces of rubber tubing, four and five inches long, respectively. To one was attached a safety pin, badly rusted.

The rubber tubing was nearly half an inch in diameter. The foreign substances had been left in the wound when New York surgeons sewed it up following an operation several months ago. Joakinen is recovering.

CAREER OF PICTURESQUE ADVENTURER ENDS IN LONDON

LONDON, Jan. 11.—William Oliver, the picturesque adventurer, who under the name of Marquis de Leuille, burst into New York society in 1886, died recently at Brighton.

Oliver was the son of a barber. He arrived in New York with seemingly proper credentials, was welcomed heartily and became very popular. He was finally exposed, however, and had to leave the city.

From New York he went to Paris, where he had a successful career posing as the Marquis de Leuille until the fraud was discovered in that city. He then established himself in London, where he was warmly welcomed by certain credulous women, and for a long time held the leadership of the local bohemia.

HOLY WAR DECLARED IN MOROCCO

CITY OF FEZ IN UPROAR; MASSACRE FEARED

Mulai Hafid Is Proclaimed Sultan. Europeans Must Be Evicted Is to Be Their Battle Cry

TANGIER, Morocco, Jan. 11.—Mulai Hafid has been proclaimed sultan at Fez, one of the capitals of Morocco, and a holy war has been declared.

Unverified reports to this effect have been in circulation for a day or two, but today official confirmation of them was received. Mulai Hafid, who some months ago was proclaimed sultan at Morocco City, was not present at Fez, and his uncle, Mulai Saramini, was made vice regent pending his arrival there.

The proclamations were issued at the mosque and all the Moorish formalities attending such ceremonies were scrupulously observed.

The Ulemas, or body of Moslem doctors, who interpret the koran of the Choffas tribes and the city, were the principals in the movement.

Further advice received here from Fez state that Mulai Hafid was proclaimed sultan on condition that he abolish taxation, make an alliance with the sultan of Turkey and suppress all relations with Europeans except those prescribed by custom and rules.

Couriers have been dispatched to Morocco City to summon Mulai Hafid to Fez.

That city is reported to be in an uproar. The residents are armed and fearful lest outbreaks of pillages and massacres occur.

FRANCE GREATLY DISTURBED BY AFFAIRS IN MOROCCO

PARIS, Jan. 11.—The government is considerably disturbed over the unexpected declaration of a holy war at Fez and the proclamation of Mulai Hafid as sultan of Morocco. It is now anxiously waiting information as to the number of tribes who will follow the rebel sultan. Everything will depend, it is explained, upon the strength which Mulai Hafid develops.

It is pointed out also that France and Spain, having a mandate from the powers, have no option but to recognize Abd-el-Aziz as the legitimate sultan. He signed the Algeiras act for Morocco and France and Spain will have to treat with him and sustain him so long as the official government remains in his hands.

Should the rebel sultan become formidable it is conceivable that the country might become divided, Mulai Hafid being supreme in the interior and Abd-el-Aziz, with the support of France and Spain, ruling the coast. Such a situation might readily produce international complications.

The immediate effect of the proclamation of Mulai Hafid as sultan is certain to be the indefinite prolongation of the stay of the French and Spanish troops, which soon were to have been withdrawn from Morocco, though it is now impossible to confide the policing of the ports to Abd-el-Aziz without the safeguard of European troops.

Pending further developments, however, the governments of France and Spain will proceed with the installation of a police force at Tangier and Rabat while General d'Armahe, the commander of the French forces in Morocco, will proceed vigorously with the work of pacifying the country around Casa Blanca.

BLACK HAND ATTACK MADE ON STREET CAR

Italian About to Start for Home is Pursued by Agents of Society. Fight Ensues—Both Arrested

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—An alleged Black Hand affray endangered lives of many persons and created a panic on a Fourteenth street cross-town car today.

The principals are Giovanni Gianno and C-sino Polomeno. Polomeno, who is a laborer, said that after he had succeeded in accumulating \$50 he began to receive letters signed by members of the Black Hand demanding that \$50 be paid. He purchased a ticket for Italy and started today for Hoboken to take passage.

After Hafid got on with a suitcase in his hand and is alleged to have attempted to stab Polomeno, who fought back with a revolver. Three shots were fired in the crowded car, but fortunately no one was hit.

A policeman disarmed both men and arrested them, Polomeno as a witness.

BETS \$5000 THAT JOHNSON, IF NOMINATED, WILL WIN

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—With the conventions which will nominate presidential candidates still months away, betting on the result of the election has already been started at the metropolitan headquarters for campaign wagers, the Hoffman house.

The wager of the campaign is reported as having been recorded last night on the offer of John S. McDonald, the turfman, to bet \$5000 that Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota, if nominated for the presidency, will be elected.

The reported taker of the wager is Thomas H. Shevlin, father of Thomas Shevlin, the Yale football player, and at one time member of the national Republican committee from Minnesota.

Labor Convention Adjourns

VALLIJO, Jan. 11.—The State Federation of Labor adjourned sine die this morning.

GOVERNMENT TO PROSECUTE LAND FRAUDS

DEPARTMENT TO CONTINUE WORK IN WEST

Federal Attorneys Will Not Be Deterred by Decision of Colorado Judge Who Dismissed Indictments

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—It was stated officially at the department of justice today that there would be no cessation in the prosecution of land fraud cases in Colorado and other western states, although the decisions of Judge Lewis have made it necessary to change the procedure in some respects.

It is pointed out by the officials of the department that, pending an appeal from Judge Lewis' decisions, which will be expedited in the supreme court as rapidly as possible, there would be no advantage in bringing further criminal proceedings on similar charges except such as might be necessary to avoid the operation of the statute of limitations. In cases in which there is danger of prospective defendants securing immunity by reason of the expiration of time it is intended to have indictments brought within the time limits, but not to ask for further trials until the pending questions are settled.

It is said positively that there is no change in the purpose, either in the interior department or the department of justice, to go actively into the prosecution of land fraud cases, and the only change which has taken place is that which was necessarily followed Judge Lewis' decisions.

It is also stated that an arrangement had been made by which a strict division of the work in these cases between the departments has been laid down, so that hereafter the department of justice will undertake no preliminary investigation, but such work will be done wholly by the interior department, which will have control of the cases until they are fully ready for prosecution.

When these have been certified to the department of justice for legal action, either in the matter of criminal prosecution or for civil proceedings for the protection of some rights of the government, the matter will be wholly under the direction of the department of justice, and all steps will be taken and all negotiations must be conducted with that department and its officials.

"I'LL SHOW THEM," SAYS F. J. HENEY

Graft Prosecutor Says He Has Cleaned Up San Francisco, but Has Not Completed His Work

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 11.—Francis J. Heney arrived in Portland today to again institute proceedings against alleged land frauds. He will begin work on Monday by taking up the case against former United States Attorney John H. Hall. After he has concluded the Hall case Heney will return to San Francisco, leaving the work of prosecuting the various land frauds in the hands of T. C. Becker, who has been appointed his assistant.

Heney says the decision in the Williams case will not affect other cases in this state. Speaking of the Senator Fulton episode, Mr. Heney declared: "We will show Mr. Fulton before we get through."

Referring to the situation in San Francisco, he said the work of prosecuting offenders in that city had just begun, and that the trials of various indicted politicians and corporation officials will be taken up as fast as circumstances will permit.

"I have cleaned up San Francisco," he said, "but I have not finished my work."

SMELTER TRUST WILL ACCEPT NEVADA ORE

Cash Will Be Paid Up to \$100 in Value. Over That Amount Forty-five Days' Time Will Be Required

GOLDFIELD, Nev., Jan. 11.—Representatives of the smelter trust have announced that they are prepared to take all Goldfield ores offered up to \$100 in value and pay cash therefor. On ores running higher they will pay \$30 cash and the remainder in forty-five days.

Encouraged by this new ruling of the smelter trust, several mines are preparing to start up.

Nearly 300 new men took jobs in the mines today, most of them former members of the Western Federation of Miners. All the active mining district is picketed by hundreds of federation men, who swarm the hills in droves attempting to influence the miners to quit work. The miners have to run the gauntlet nearly a half mile long to get to the quarters provided by the mine owners, but so far very few have seceded.

VICTIMS OF TURKEY'S OPPRESSION PLAN WAR

Armenians, Greeks, Bulgarians and Others Hold Secret Meeting in Paris—Discuss Overthrow of Sultan

PARIS, Jan. 11.—Representatives of the different peoples who are being oppressed by Turkey, including the Young Turks, Armenians, Greeks, Bulgarians, Albanians, Kurds, Jews and Arabs, held a secret congress in this city today.

It was unanimously decided to organize in common action to overthrow the present Turkish government and for the substitution of a liberal, constitutional and parliamentary regime. The details of this revolutionary program were not published. Armenians, Turks and Bulgarians in America were represented at the congress.

Actor Hangs Himself

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Charles J. Jackson, an actor and nephew of Joseph Jefferson, committed suicide in his room at the Hotel Gerard today by hanging. Jackson, who was 45 years old, had been out of employment for eight months and became despondent when, after obtaining a place in a company, he was unable to memorize the lines of his part.
