IRISH PEGGY MAKES A HIT

PLAY OF POWDER AND PATCHES WELL LIKED

BIG PRODUCTION OFFERED AT THE BURBANK

Drama is a Biographical Nature Fake, but Tells an Interesting Story and is Elaborately Staged

THERE is just enough of fact in Frances Aymer Matthews' play of "Pretty Peggy" which is given a highly elaborate and effective production at the Burbank theater this week to make the student wonder at its success. The play presents a number of characters who stroll blandly through the mazes of biographical falsehood that the dramatist may make a heroine of Peg Woffington and a hero of David Garrick.

Production Is Complete
To begin with, the Burbank management has given the comedy drama an elaborate staging. The first act, showing Madame Violante's circus booth in Dublin, is a decided novelty for local theatergoers; the last, showing the Covent Garden stage, set with an effective, though ultra modern, forest of Arden, is doubly so.

Peggy the Comedienne
Miss Hall's Peggy is best in the lighter moments of the character, where her gay and sprightly acting is a genuine delight. Her lack of impressiveness in the heavier scenes, appearing petulant rather than tense; but her comedy, as it always does, justifies cordial commendation.

ANNIVERSARY TEXT "LAW OF SERVICE"

REV. E. J. HARPER DELIVERS AN IMPRESSIVE SERMON

Eleventh Year of Knox Presbyterian Church Marked by Special Services—Spirit of Sacrifice Analyzed

The eleventh anniversary of the organization of the Knox Presbyterian church was marked yesterday by anniversary services. Rev. E. J. Harper, pastor, preached an anniversary sermon at the morning service, as follows: "Christ said that love was the fulfillment of the law, and he gives this new commandment as the highest expression of the law of God. This law which is fundamental, finds its manifestation in three laws, which may be called the social laws of Jesus.

Christ's View of Service
"Christ did not look upon service as a disagreeable necessity which must be endured nor did he teach that it was to be rendered for compensation, but it was to be regarded as a privilege.
"Whoever will be chief among you let him be your servant." This makes the law of service, not incidental, but fundamental.

Life as a Trust
"Christ teaches that our substance, time, powers, opportunities are all given us for service.
"Life is a sacred trust. It has come to us from the treasured past with store garnered from each generation. What this treasure cost cannot be reckoned. This trust is a gift that is contained in the wonderful word heredity. We are trustees for the future and we are bound to hand to our descendants the legacy enriched. Such service implies self-abnegation.

Self Must Perish

A PRACTICAL SACK NIGHTDRESS



A plain, well fitting model for a night-dress, which may be developed either in longcloth or flannel, is a welcome acquisition to the woman who prefers home-made garments to those which may be bought ready for wear. The design here illustrated is an extremely practical one, the yoke insuring a comfortable fit about the neck and shoulders, while the sack shaping of the gown effectually does away with the uncomfortable bulkiness that so often distinguishes flannel garments. If desired the gown may be made in the square neck effect shown in the smaller sketch, in which development it is cut without the yoke. If muslin or cambric is used for making lace or embroidery may be used for garniture, but for a flannel development all the trimming necessary is a little fancy stitching worked in silk.
