PLANS TO SAVE \$1000 A YEAR ON SPRINKLING

PASADENA, Jan. 31.—The city council today awarded to Henshaw, Bulkeley & Co. of Los Angeles a contract to supply the city with ten sixty-gallon steel tank sprinkling wagons at a cost of \$3,748.25.

It is planned by the street department to save the city at least \$1000 a year by this method of sprinkling over prices paid for many years back under a general contract.

WILL SUE VENICE DOGE FOR \$200,000

TRUSTEE TO FILE COUNTER SUIT AGAINST KINNEY

Claims Beach Magnate Made Statement That City Officials Paved Way to Have Town Burned

VENICE, Jan. 31.—In retaliation against Abbot Kinney, upon whose instruction suit for \$100,000 was brought against him yesterday in Los Angeles, Trustee George C. Hickey of Ocean Park stated today he will bring a counter suit against Kinney for \$200,000 damages for defamatory statements.

Hickey claims he has reputable witnesses by whom he can prove that Kinney recently stated that the Kinney company had disorganized the fire department in order to burn Venice.

Suits filed yesterday by the Kinney company are against Trustee George C. Hickey, Assistant Street Superintendent Carroll and Janitor Taylor for \$100,000 each.
