

LONG SHOTS HAVE WON AT ARCADIA

TALENT IS HANDED A LARGE SIZED PACKAGE

George Davis' Hard Luck Is Feature of Dull Day at Santa Anita—He Fails to Bet on Thirty to One Shot

GEORGE S. DAVIS is the hard luck kid of all the race tracks in the world. Acting on the advice of his near-trainer, Mike Donovan, Davis sat in the cafe at Santa Anita yesterday and let his entry in the fourth race, George Swain, go to the post unbacked at 30 to 1, and when he happened to look through the window the owner splashed Swain in front of a flock of miscellaneous hounds by two lengths.

This isn't the first time it has happened to Davis. One of the most popular owners on the turf, he has been panned all season by those who should treat him the best they know how, but all Davis gets is the short end of it all the way through. A suggestion would be to can his stable hands and bet them from the ground.

It is only because features were so shy yesterday that Davis' hard luck can be picked out as the specialty of the day's card. But at that he is entitled to all the sympathy there is to offer, for any time a good Indian has a dusty road to travel and then is switched into a byway when the asphalt comes along is certainly entitled to something.

The program offered to the patrons of the sport of kings (another name for bookmakers and stockholders) was about as poor as could be figured out in a season's search. Nothing but selling events had a place on the card, and they were all more or less several points under the regulation. The talent was handed a large sized package, for only two favorites connected with numbers and long shots had the things to themselves for all afternoon.

Laura Clay Loses

Laura Clay, making her first start here was made an even money choice for the opening number, but this did not prevent her from losing to Kerry, with Miller up. The price was loose on Albion H., and in the last jump she got up in time to show.

Aside from the third horse, there was nothing to it but the front ones. Miller and Schilling kept their mounts off well, and kept them there to the end. Kerry came away from Laura at the end of the stand and won by three lengths, with Albion H. trailing in front of what was left when she nipped Royal Queen on the post.

The wise ones figured Traffic to beat Antioch, but they made their numbers without considering Schilling. The jockey on the Thomas trick apparently was not trying a lick, and finished second under an easy ride, with Colored Lady third. The nigger horse might have done better but Burns kept her in a pocket under the stretch and she finished in the show hole with her mouth wide open.

After quitting in the stretch and coming again, L. C. Widrig, liberal priced favorite for the third number, copped the mile race from Chief Desmond by the mile race from Chief Desmond by a nose, with Sun Mark third. Widrig was held at 28 in the ring, Billy Bowlegs being the next choice a notch higher and running last.

It was the first time many of these boobs had been asked to go the distance, and the gambolers hesitated before playing any of them. Chief Desmond was the medium of a plunge at post time, and his backers felt highly flattered at the far end of the grand stand. Here the Chief was in front of L. C. Widrig, the pair having held the lead all the way around, but in a drive Martin brought Widrig up to win by a stingy margin. Sun Mark was stuck at the head of the stretch and stuck when Ouardi tried to usurp her honors.

The real plugs had a chance in the fourth race, and George Swain was elected winner. Laura E. gathered in the best of what was left, and Miller rode Transmute into third money when he trimmed Rey Del Mundo a head. Frankie Dwyer and his friends were there to put the Baldwin trick over, but they failed when Ross found a pocket in which to stick.

The race was an ordinary affair, those which landed in the money and Rey Del Mundo forming a division of their own out in front. Swain traded places with Laura E. in the final furlong and took the coin by two lengths, the next three following heads apart, with Laura leading Transmute and Del Mundo. The latter might have been the goods had Ross kept him clear of the front ones and given him a chance to use his speed.

Little Minister Wins

Little Minister figured to win the fifth event, but as good as 15 to 1 he had against the Zimmer candidate, while Firm Foot got the play at two. The result showed the Minister better by a nose, with the favorite second and Huapala third. Head Dance also came in for a liberal backing, but could not do well enough to get up with the others when the numbers were flashed.

Head Dance flattered the short priced bunch by leading for three-quarters of a mile, where Firm Foot was rushed to the front by Miller. Right at the end it looked as though the Marvellous One were going to put one over, but Little Minister, close up all the way, came with a rush and scored by a nose. Huapala never left third position, despite Musgrave's mediocre effort.

The last number found nothing but a meeting with support, and her 3 to 1 price was justified when she scored a five lengths victory over Varieties. Daisy Frost was the third, but Little Minister, there and sticking when the other hounds ran as though anchored.

The first race brings out an ordinary lot of 3-year-olds that will sprint five furlongs and three straggle jockeys will sport colors.

Snappager has shown speed in her previous races and is a quick breaker. Dolly is a nice looking filly, but a slow beginner. Ross will look after her chances. Latona and Margie are both speedy and consistent performers. Belle Griffin and Velma C. work well in their morning trials.

Six two-year-olds will go over the three and a half-furlong route and the black and white cap, the colors of R. P. Williams, will be carried by Miller on Blamless. Frank Clancy is a nice colt and has a world of early speed in his races. Red Mimic is a grand looking filly from the barn of R. P. Williams. Jockey Burns will ride her. Ned Jram will make his debut and is a superbly bred youngster.

The third race, a purse affair at one mile for 3-year-olds and upward, brings out a good lot that should furnish a close finish and keep sport. Tony Faust is a stake horse that could beat good ones the past summer. Gailavert will probably go in the stake race. Ed the Judge and the other performers, Belle Griffin and Velma C. work well in their morning trials.

Probably the closest finish of the season will be in the Ventura handicap, the fourth event on the card, as such good stake performers, Belle Griffin, Frank Clancy, First Peep, Light Wool, Wexford, Rubric and several others are carded to start, and the weights have been arranged so nicely that it should be a hotly contested affair the entire journey.

The fifth race brings out ten that are evenly matched and the one lucky enough to pick the winner should get a close race. The odds are against Alma Boy who will have E. Martin in the saddle. Sink Spring will be ridden by R. Brooks. Chalfonte will tote Musgrave and Ross will have the leg up on John C. Gains. Blair rides Kirkfield Belle and Taylor rides Crepps Beckham.

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SONS OF PROMINENT MEN ARE ARRESTED

YOUNG MEN HELD BY POLICE ON SUSPICION

Are Said to Be Addicted to the Use of Opium, and Thugs Were Committed So Drug Could Be Obtained

Robert L. Gates and Robert Bell, said to be sons of prominent parents in Southern California, were arrested last night on North Main street by Detectives Ingram and Cline and booked at the central police station on suspicion.

There is no specific charge against either of the men, so far as the Los Angeles police are concerned, but it is alleged they are wanted for a series of burglaries committed in Stockton, Oakland, Fruitvale and Sacramento.

Young Bell is the son of a well known attorney and has been arrested on criminal charges of a petty nature before. Gates is also said to have a bad record. Both men are alleged to be addicted to the use of opium and their thefts are said to be committed for the purpose of supplying themselves with the drug.

ALLEGED MURDERER IS FOUND BY POLICE Japanese Accused of Killing i. Okasaki Denies He Fired Fatal Shots—Notorious Smuggler Arrested

H. Ito, alleged to be the murderer of P. Okasaki, the rooming house keeper who was shot to death in the Japanese restaurant at 1111 North York street Tuesday night, was arrested last night in a North San Pedro street lodging house by Detectives Hosick and Zeigler and booked at the central police station on suspicion.

The prisoner denies he is the man who did the shooting or that he had anything to do with the crime. He stated that a police station shortly after his arrest that the man who is wanted for the crime, while of the same name as himself, was an entirely complete investigation can be made of the case.

In connection with the Okasaki shooting the police also arrested last night T. Wehara, who is known as the king of Japanese smugglers. Detectives Hosick and Zeigler allege that Wehara is the man who furnishes money to the Japanese gamblers in Los Angeles and that he is a partner in the business and assist him in his smuggling operations.

Wehara smuggles Japanese girls into this country for immoral purposes, and two pretty little Japanese women were arrested with him at 1111 North York street who are said to have just been brought across the Mexican border and were intended as inmates of a Japanese brothel in the street which was conducted by Okasaki, the man who was shot by Ito.

It is now alleged the cause of the killing of Okasaki by Ito was not because of the former's refusal to lend the latter money, but on account of a quarrel over the division of spoils in the smuggling of the two girls who were taken by the police last night.
