MAYOR READS ADVICE TO THE COUNCILMEN

All Proceedings Pertaining to Purchase of Water Plants Must Again Be Gone Over by Voters

PASADENA, Feb. 25.—As has been predicted all proceedings pertaining to the purchase of the water plants by the city will have to be gone over again, and the voters will have a chance to say whether they will pay nearly a million dollars to the water companies for the properties as they now stand.

Reads Correspondence

After the council heard the reading of voluminous correspondence on the subject, Mayor Earley spoke in favor of resubmitting the entire matter to the people. He expressed the fear that if only the betterments are voted on at this time they may be defeated, leaving the city without sufficient funds to purchase the plants, and all councilmen agreed with him.

PASADENA, Feb. 25.—The city council today ordered the opening of Grand avenue through the properties of Mrs. Robert J. Burdette and Mrs. Benjamin Blossom in spite of the protests of both these property owners. Grand avenue at present stops abruptly at the north line of Mrs. Burdette's property and as far back as

three years ago adjacent property owners sought to have that thoroughfare extended.

During the intervening time the project has been opposed, principally by Mr. and Mrs. Blossom, who claim that the opening of the street will divide their grounds in such a manner as to cause untold damage.
