ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING IS HELD BY DEMOCRATS

LEAGUE HEARS ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT

Large Audience Gathers at Noonday Session and Hears a Speech on the Approaching Campaign

The largest audience yet gathered at the noonday sessions of the Los Angeles Democratic league was that which yesterday heard Thomas E. Gibbon discuss the approaching presidential campaign.

Following the regular spread at the Westminster the Democrats present heard a pointed hour address, Mr. Gibbon saying in part: "The wonderful production of gold which followed making gold the standard and the free silver doctrine advocated by William J. Bryan."

"It does not follow, however, that we have eliminated the quantitative theory of money," he said. "As evidence of this I would merely call your attention to the fact that the banks of the country, in order to prevent financial distress, have recently ground out millions of dollars of so-called money that they might afford a necessary increase to the circulating medium."

The doctrine of free silver was eliminated because of the enormous production of gold, a thing which no man could have foreseen at that time. "But we have not had the income tax eliminated; we have not had the inheritance tax eliminated; we have not had regulation of corporations eliminated; we have not had obedience to the law by the strongest as well as the weakest eliminated; we have not had the principles of tariff reform—so that it would not be a heavy burden on the people—eliminated."

"Whoever is elected, whether Democrat or Republican, the platform will be largely one that Mr. Bryan has intimated in the last twelve years."
