

GREAT MAN TO ARRIVE

JENKIN LLOYD JONES TO BE HERE TODAY

PROMINENT UNITARIAN WORKER WILL LECTURE

"The Three Reverences" Will Be the Subject of the Speaker at the First Church Next Wednesday Night

Jenkin Lloyd Jones, who will arrive in Los Angeles today from Chicago, is one of the most conspicuous figures in the Unitarian church in this country.

Mr. Jones was born in Wales in 1843; came to America in infancy; was reared on a Wisconsin farm; served three years in the Union army, and then entered the Meadville Theological school, from which he graduated in 1870.

Has Broad Mind

He has never been a narrow denominationalist, but has done much to broaden his own denomination and bring it into relation with other churches.

Because the popular demand for the nomination of Captain John D. Fredericks, district attorney, for congress to succeed James McLachlan, was increasing and becoming dangerous, Walter F. Parker, Southern Pacific boss, (who says he has retired from politics) called on Mr. Fredericks yesterday and insisted that Mr. Fredericks withdraw from the race.

Woman Present, But Husband Gets Divorce CHARGES OF DESERTION AGAINST WIFE STAND Man Claims Helpmeet Left Him Six Weeks After Marriage, but Wife Says She Is Now Willing to Return

Notwithstanding she appeared in court without an attorney and denied statements made by her husband, a divorce was yesterday granted in the superior court to Joseph Fritchie from his wife, Florence Fritchie, on the ground of desertion.
