PROVIDES LARGE FUND FOR ENTERTAINING

ADVERTISING IS ALSO MADE POSSIBLE

Long Beach Lays Aside Sum to Spread Its Glories Abroad and Support Amusements and Band

Special to The Herald. LONG BEACH, April 30.—An advertising and entertainment fund, calculated to make it possible for the city to properly advertise its attractions and to entertain its visitors, was provided for this morning by a resolution adopted by the city council.

This is considered an important step and one which will relieve a few citizens who have always borne upon their shoulders the responsibility for things in which the whole citizenship should share.

One of the principal uses of this fund will probably be the support of a municipal band, a problem hitherto only partially solved by the subscription of a limited few, and the direful worries of the musicians employed and of their leader will be at an end.

The money for this fund may now be transferred to the subscriptions. A tax levy to provide the fund will be ordered later. The question of supporting a band in this manner would provoke lively discussion.

REPORTS SUBMITTED BY UTILITY CORPORATIONS

Long Beach City Council Receives Figures Showing Business Done by Companies, with Gains and Losses

LONG BEACH, April 30.—At this morning's meeting of the city council reports were received from the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company, the Edison company and the Long Beach Gas company showing the business transacted during the past year and the corporations' profits and losses.

The Edison company's statement set forth that its receipts for lights and power amounted to \$110,165.36, a profit of \$55,057.10 above expenses. Its profit on the gas business was given at \$15,747.29. The Long Beach Gas company's report gave its revenue for last year as \$20,156.42, with expenses amounting to \$27,902.22, or \$5,745.80 more than was taken in. The Pacific Telephone company's statement showed total receipts of \$18,661.89, against expenditures of \$23,158.45.

MUCH ILL LUCK COMES TO LONG BEACH BOATMEN

MINOR MATTERS TAKEN UP BY LONG BEACH COUNCIL

The railroads did not monopolize the attention of the city fathers, however, as might be judged. Permission for the Monrovia board of trade to hang a picture of the football city in the Salt Lake depot pavilion was denied on the grounds that it would be a bad precedent.

WILL CONSOLIDATE INTO ONE DISTRICT

KEPPEL APPROVES PLANS OF BOARD

Santa Monica, Ocean Park, Playa del Rey, La Ballona, Machado, Palms and Sawtelle Schools to Be United

County School Superintendent Mark Keppel has approved the plan, in which the Santa Monica board of education has taken the initiative, of organizing into one large school district the new separate districts of Santa Monica, Ocean Park, Playa del Rey, La Ballona, Machado, The Palms and Sawtelle.

In the opinion of prominent Los Angeles educators the consummation of this project will prove a boon to the thousands of families to the present population of these beach communities. In a letter to Superintendent Horace M. Rebeck of the Santa Monica schools Mr. Keppel commended the plan as "an excellent one" and adds: "If I can contribute in any way to the success of the undertaking I shall be glad to do so."

One of the results of the combination will be the establishment of a large, up-to-date polytechnic high school like the one in Los Angeles. There would be one high school district for the whole bay country.

'WHITE FLY' SUBJECT OF EXPERT'S LECTURE

COMMISSIONER JEFFREY ADDRESSES CONVENTION

Fruit Growers of the State Listen to Speech Illustrated with Stereoscopic Views—Sessions Close This Morning

Special to The Herald. RIVERSIDE, April 30.—Tonight delegates to the State Fruit Growers' convention heard from State Horticultural Commissioner Jeffrey and his assistant, E. K. Carnes, as to the eradication of the white fly in the northern citrus belt.

The lecture was illustrated with stereoscopic views which demonstrated the havoc necessary to eradicate the pest.

Handsome orchard and costly shrubbery in private grounds were sacrificed in order to remove the plant food of the pest.

Mr. Jeffrey said that representatives of the growers were left in each town which were watching developments. Constant inspection is made of orchards. In Orville some groves have been found with the white fly, and Bakersfield the eradication is practically complete.

DOES EXPERIMENTAL WORK

He said the government commission had done experimental work all the way from Santa Barbara to Chula Vista in San Diego county. The commission had adopted a formula of one part hydrocyanic acid, one part sulphuric acid and three parts water for fumigating purposes. Good work had been done in the extermination of the purple scale in Orange county.
