


NEWS OF FRATERNAL AND SOCIAL SOCIETIES

Wolcott, A. H. Moore, J. H. Onell and John Wessell, warriors; M. M. Moore, Howard Kimble, D. H. McDonald and W. C. Melick, braves. After the chief's degree had been conferred and regular order of business finished all journeyed to the banquet hall, where those good things that appeals to the inner man were found spread out bountifully.


Tuesday, April 28, was a red letter day for Red Men in Southern California. There were nearly 800 Redmen who participated in the grand parade at Santa Ana. Red Men from tribes in Los Angeles, Pasadena, San Pedro, Ocean Park and many other points were in attendance. The largest number of three coaches and a baggage car took on board the Mohonk degree train of sixteen men in red paint and regalia, a band of twenty pieces and a drum major. The tribes led by the Bernardino picked up a bunch of Coahuilla tribe and degree team, and at Riverside took on board sixteen war-bedecked and painted Indians carrying a large number of Hiawatha tribe, and at Corona kidnaped not only the degree team, but about half of the town, so it seems that the Red Men carry money on the goods, for the entire train was packed to the guards. Everything was peaceful enough until the special car left Santa Ana, when then those hideous warwhoops and yells burst upon the unsuspecting community. The sheriff of Orange county, chief of police and many others came out to quell the disturbance, thinking that the entire populace was about to be massacred, but when they found out that it was only a bunch of "red fellows" like the native boys of old, when in Boston harbor before the revolution they boarded a vessel laden with tea and without any ceremony threw overboard the tea, they were before they would stand for taxation without representation. At the depot the line of march was formed, headed by a delegation of the Red Men carrying the American flag, followed closely by the Redlands band, then the degree teams in full uniform coming in the respective order of the tribes: Bernardino, Riverside and Corona. As they marched up Fourth street to Eagle hall there were scouts and runners out with whistles and flags, announcing to the Osage tribe the arrival of the chiefs from the visiting tribes. In the big hunt there were many palefaces, carried, and the particular was "missionary" that was a 240 pounder, and he was made a subject of much merriment, for two braves had him bound and gagged, and were leading him to the interested spectators, and when the ghost and snake dance was held the poor prisoner was up in the air, in other words scared out of his wits. While the Eagle hall is a credit to a city like Santa Ana it was far too small for the grand row-wow or council of war, for there were over 1000 Red Men. After certain preliminaries, and each Red Man proved his right to a seat around the council brand, the fire was kindled and a large number of Red Men were adopted by the team from Riverside. The second (warrior's) degree was put on by the Naragansett team, and the third (chief's) degree was given by the crack Mohonk team. This team is considered the best south of the Tehachapi. The ceremonies were concluded by 1 o'clock, when the party of Red Men were escorted to the Odd Fellows hall, where a sumptuous repast awaited their attention. H. C. Hibbard, the old warrior from Riverside, and also the district deputy of this district, was toastmaster. Several brilliant addresses, the most notable one being made by Albert Rubenstein of Hanford and a member of the grand council of California. Mr. Rubenstein in his remarks said that he would help support Redlands in getting the great council in 1909 and that the society was entitled to it and that it should and would get it. Hurrah for Albert! We think he's all right. 
MODERN WOODMEN OF AMERICA

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
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KNIGHTS AND LADIES OF SECURITY

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

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
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
