GOVERNMENT WINS ITS SIXTH IMPORTANT CASE

GRAZING REGULATIONS HELD CONSTITUTIONAL. Decision Sustains Ruling Made Recently by the Secretary of Agriculture in Regard to National Forests

The government has just won its sixth important case concerning the matter of grazing regulations made by the secretary of agriculture to control grazing in the national forests. In the United States court at Denver, Colo., Judge Robert E. Lewis has overruled the decision of Judge Light, a wealthy stockman of Pitkin county, Colorado, which contended that the grazing regulations in force on the national forests are unconstitutional.

Macedonian Villages Are Scenes of Blood. Turkish Authorities Favor Propaganda as Offset to Bulgarian Movement and Abstain from Furnishing Protection

In the district of Uskub several Serbian bands have made their appearance, and operations are in active progress under the Volvodes Peshkovitch, Traiko, Vassil and others. Many villages have been razed and the inhabitants driven to the mountains. The Serbian authorities, though disposed to favor the Serbian propaganda as a useful counterpoise to the more dangerous Bulgarian movement, have not yet acceded to this request, but no steps have been taken for the protection of the villages.

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San Bernardino County FESTIVAL WILL BE COLOR POEM

FRATERNAL ORDERS MAKE A GORGEOUS DISPLAY

CABIN ERECTED BY PIONEERS UNIQUE FEATURE

Test Illumination of San Bernardino Streets Elicits Unstinted Applause, Effects Being Unexpectedly Beautiful

SAN BERNARDINO, May 17.—One of the pretty features of the coming Festival of the Arrowhead, which will open Tuesday evening with the crowning of Queen Lola and the accompanying stage pictures portraying the various Indian legends connected with the mystic Arrowhead will be the many street booths that are being erected.

Various fraternal orders lead in this feature, foremost of which are the Knights of Pythias and Pythian Sisters, with one of the most artistic creations, representing an ancient Grecian castle. The Native Sons and Daughters also have a beautiful booth in the mission type done in festival colors, while the Elks, Masons and other orders all have handsome designs. These booths will be used largely for rest rooms.

The coronation ball Tuesday evening at the pavilion will be one of the most elaborate functions of the sort ever seen in Southern California. The interior of the immense pavilion has been transformed into a veritable fairyland in festival colors, with electric lights by the thousand. The affair will be a most brilliant one, and it is expected it will be witnessed by a large crowd, as the pavilion balconies have a seating capacity of fully 20,000 people.

The pioneer cabin erected by the members of the local Pioneer society will be one of the unique displays. It has been built by the pioneers alone, some 70 to 80 years ago. They went to the mountains, cut the timber, split the shakes and did all the work in connection with the erection of the structure, which has not a nail in it, wooden pegs in true pioneer style being used. The cabin is furnished in true frontier fashion, the old crane being in the fireplace. From this beams, coffee and other pioneer necessities will be served to the visitors during the festival. In the rear are to be found a 49-er camp, the old oaken bucket, an old-fashioned ash leach and other features that are interesting to the younger generation.

The floral parade Thursday morning promises to be a delightful affair, there being a large number of rigs entered that will be a mass of flowers. It will excel anything of the sort ever before attempted in this city.

The illumination of the buildings and streets is a marvel. The lights were turned on to honor last evening as a test and brought forth exclamations of admiration and surprise from all who saw the spectacle. It can be said truthfully that no more beautiful or elaborate system has ever been used for illumination by any city of the size in the country.

COUNTY'S BABY CROP WAS OBVIOUSLY GOOD

SCHOOL CENSUS GIVES ODD STUDY IN FIGURES

Total Number of Children Under 17 Has Increased Greatly, but Fewer Come Within the Educational Limit

Special to The Herald. SAN BERNARDINO, May 17.—For some time there has been a general opinion that the county school census, which has just been completed, affords a strange study in figures. While the number of children in the county under the age of 17 has shown an increase of 1164 in the county during the past year, the number of children of school age—that is, between 5 and 17 years—has shown an actual decrease of 232, all of which indicates that there must have been a most plentiful crop of babies in the county during the year. The total number of children of school age is 9431, while that of children under 17 years of age is 14,173.
