Frank Webster delivered the goods in great style in his fight with Tom Hennessey of San Francisco.



BOTH ANXIOUS FOR THE GONG

DALTON AND CARSEY READY FOR BATTLE

FORMR HAS TWO POUNDS BEST OF WEIGHTS

Each in Perfect Trim and Confident of Knockout Victory—Spaghetti Champ Is Especially Well Trained

Visits were made by representatives of the Jeffries Athletic club to the fight camps yesterday to weigh in the scrappers who will entertain the fans this afternoon at the Vernon club, and the quartet of maulers weighed in below the required notches. Kid Dalton tipped the beam at 122 pounds, which is one pound below the agreed weight, and Frank Carsey was two pounds lighter. Peter Sullivan weighed in at 140 pounds, two pounds less than the agreed weight, and his opponent, Howard Baker, is two pounds lighter.

Interest centers in the showing that Dalton will make against Carsey, who has had more experience in fighting main events, and who has made a record in the ring that entitles him to rank with the best boys in the country at his weight. This is to be the coming-out party of the spaghetti champion, and will be his first real main event scrap. He appreciates the opportunity and his friends need have no fear that he will be any worse than in perfect condition. He has trained faithfully for the fight, realizing how much depends upon victory, and after he had been delighted with his contest, he expected to whip the imported fighter inside the limit.

Dalton will not go into the ring this time as fast as he usually is when he scraps, and he will be in more perfect trim to stand the gaff over the 25-round route. In fact, this is the first time that he has trained properly for a fight, and his appearance indicates that he is in trim to do the best he knows how. To those who are accustomed to seeing a flabby, overfed, half-trained scrapper in action when he is swapping wallops with his opponent, he will be a big surprise. He actually looks to be thin and drawn, but this is the result of comparing his former appearance with the Kid Dalton that will fight today.

Carsey is also in perfect trim. He has worked with Peter Sullivan during the training period, and is made favorite to win from Dalton because he has shown speed and cleverness, with satisfactory punching ability, that impresses one that he is to be a real problem for Dalton to solve. Carsey hits like a flash and his blows carry steam behind them, as Sullivan admits. The boys seem to be evenly matched in hitting, weight, height, reach and gameness, the only real advantage held by either being the superior cleverness, experience and speed of Dalton, and these may develop into real factors in the result this afternoon. Dalton is game and can take punishment without flinching, and Howard Baker at his back behind his blows that enables him to make an opponent respect him. He will have one advantage that will show to good effect if the scrap goes the limit. He is better adapted to a fight over distance than is Carsey, and the stamina of Dalton is urged by his friends as an important consideration. He reckoning on the possibilities of the fight.

The fans consider the match an attractive one because it will be a prime scrap all the way and there will be sufficient walloping to make the moments fly uncommonly fast. Real fighting always gets the applause, and the Jeffries card appears unusually attractive because real fighters only are to be on the Vernon program. The preliminary, a 15-round bout between Peter Sullivan and Howard Baker at 142 pounds should be a whirlwind affair while it lasts and neither scrapper expects the battle to go to the limit.

The preliminary will be called at 2 o'clock promptly, and the main event will follow without delay. Jeffries will referee the main event and Tommy Walsh will take care of the prelim.
