

Both boys are perfectly trained and each predicts that he will win by knockout early in the scrap.

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

POLICE ARREST MANY AT RACES

PRISONERS ARE GIVEN ROUGH TREATMENT

HANDCUFF SEVERAL AND MARCH THEM OFF GROUNDS

Great Excitement Occasioned by Officers, but Crowd Is Orderly, Merely Protesting Harsh Actions

NEW YORK, July 16.—There were exciting scenes at the Brighton Beach race track today, resulting from the tactics of the police in their determination to run down and round up the track gamblers.

Arrests were made right and left by plain clothes men, detailed at the tracks in place of the uniformed squad that has been on duty there.

The crowd of 5000 persons in the field and in the stands was wrought up to a high pitch of excitement when detectives not only took a score or more of suspects into custody but proceeded to search some of them in full view of the spectators.

There were no demonstrations against the officers, however, and their work was accompanied by nothing more serious than outspoken remarks of disapproval at the treatment accorded the prisoners, some of whom were brought handcuffed from the field through the grandstand.

It had been hinted before the afternoon racing began that extreme measures would be taken, even to the extent of closing the track, if the anti-betting law was flagrantly violated or if there were any riotous demonstrations.

The behavior of the crowd in general was excellent, however, and no radical action was deemed necessary.

Some of the men arrested on the track were released after being escorted out of the grounds. Eight men, however, were taken to Brooklyn police headquarters and afterward released on bail for a hearing tomorrow.

Grand jury investigation of conditions at the tracks is proceeding and District Attorney Elder of Kings county said today that within twenty-four hours he expected indictments of prominent persons in connection with alleged violation of the anti-betting law.

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BASEBALL GOSSIP

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YALE MAKES SLIGHT PROFIT UPON SPORTS Remarkable Increase in Expenses and Falling Off in Receipts Causes of Unusually Small Net Balance

ATHLETICS at Yale university paid poorly during the season of 1907-8, according to the annual reports for the various sports by the Financial Union, through the Yale Alumni Weekly.

The striking feature is that the expenses of conducting certain sports show a falling off, football traveling expenses dropping from \$2217 to \$1124, alcohol mixtures for massage purposes from \$1003 to \$906, hotels and meals from \$6464 to \$4577, and administration from \$7756 to \$2958.

For the year the balance sheets show a decrease of profit, because the Harvard football game was played in Cambridge. The reserve fund now amounts to \$113,429.

Of the sports, the moneymaker is football, for the receipts from this sport were \$84,151 and the expenses \$41,251; baseball took in \$25,054 and paid out \$20,043.

The other major sports, rowing and track and field, showed a loss as usual, the boat club collecting \$2525, while its expenses were \$16,397, and the athletics yielded \$1855 and cost \$13,495.

Yale's share of the receipts of the Harvard game was \$38,615, from the Princeton game \$22,666. The biggest item of expense chargeable against football was \$13,651, for repairs on the field stands.

The total receipts for the year were \$83,588, as compared with \$106,219 the previous year.

AMERICAN ATHLETE HURT KIESBARDEN, July 16.—M.
