Strike in Wonder King
A. H. Douglas, president of the Rawhide Wonder King Combination Mining and Leasing company, reports a strike in the property he is operating on the Wonder King block. While drifting west of the shaft a big pay shoot was opened up. It is four feet in width and has an average value of from \$60 to \$70 a ton. Already the vein has been opened up for a distance of twenty feet and it is pitching toward the east and toward the shaft.
