

AUGUR VICTORY FOR GOOD ROADS

PRECINCT WORKERS FEELING MUCH ENCOURAGED

BANNERS AND PENNANTS READY FOR GENERAL USE

All Political Parties Loan Their Committeemen to the Highway Campaigners for This Week's Bond Election

Scores of workers in the good roads movement took advantage of the Saturday half holiday yesterday to report at the chamber of commerce headquarters concerning the situation in their respective districts. It was a busy afternoon for all.

District and precinct committeemen reported that indications were good for a healthy majority, the principal danger being from overconfidence among the voters. If all who favor bonds vote the cause will carry easily.

The campaign committee wishes to impress on every voter that the safest and best plan is to vote in pairs, or rather to go to the polls in pairs. Enthusiastic roads advocates are advised to seek out, if possible, the very busy or the least enthusiastic advocates and persuade them to go to the polling places and act as escorts.

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The committee is still anxious to list autos, bicycles and other vehicles to be used next Thursday in conveying voters to the polls and to carry the committeemen from one precinct to another.

Yesterday all the banners and pennants which are to be distributed Monday were delivered. These will be fastened to every street car and to all autos and vehicles whose owners apply for them at the chamber of commerce.

It is probable that the mayor, will which action will enable all city employees to get to the polls.

The Annandale Yacht club has sent in strong resolutions indorsing the good roads bonds.

AUTO PARTY CONVERTS MANY FOREIGN-BORN RESIDENTS

Spanish, French and Italians residing in Los Angeles and the county yesterday had their attention drawn to the special bond election in a unique manner.

Frank Dominguez started from the Nadeau hotel at 2 o'clock with two autos one containing a negro quartet, the other himself, two guests and a large map. He drove through the Spanish, Italian and French neighborhoods.

He held two large meetings at the Plaza, one each at Ord and Catalina and a large one in Ferrano's place on North Main street, where he spoke to 1000 Italians.

All the meetings were well attended and the enthusiasm was unbounded. Mr. Dominguez especially appealed to his listeners as workmen, telling them that 80 per cent of the bond money would be spent for labor, and urging them to vote favorably that their fellow workmen might have jobs this winter.

VOTES FOR GOOD ROADS WILL HASTEN PROSPERITY

Assistant Superintendent of Schools J. B. Monlux has written to the good roads campaign committee a letter which the members say should be read by every Southern Californian who has the interests of the section at heart.

Mr. Monlux writes: "I have traveled for miles over almost every road that centers in Los Angeles or leads from city to city or mountains to sea, and have always felt that our roads were for the most part very poor, whereas with comparatively small expense and trouble they might be made to rank among the very best."

"We are all looking forward to a richer and more populous community, and whatever contributes to the upbuilding of a greater Southern California contributes to the welfare and comfort of each and every individual in this section, whether laborer, property owner or man of leisure, whether he hails from city, village or country."

"These roads are not to be built for the autolst, but to bring them here with their money to spend; they are not for the tourists, but to bring them here in ever increasing numbers; and to do that we need something more than climate. We must furnish comfort and amusement and good cheer."

MUSICAL COMEDY GIRLS TO RIDE BIG OSTRICHES

SENSATIONAL, to say the least, will be the scheme planned by Harry Askin and Mortimer Singer of Chicago, two young showmen who have made rapid strides during the past five years in producing big musical comedy successes. Their latest idea for their new musical comedy, "The Girl Question," that opens in New York at Wallack's theater in August, is to furnish their "pony ballet" with real live ostriches, which are to be thoroughly trained for riding purposes so that these diminutive sou-

The impression made by the right hind foot of a Missouri mule is like coming in contact with a powder puff in comparison, and should some "wee broler" of "The Girl Question" ballet suddenly find himself swiftly soaring toward the "peanut heaven" of Wallack's theater it will be understood that Fighting Bob or one of his feathered comrades has suddenly taken a dislike to this particular "squad."

At first the ostriches have to be blindfolded until they become familiar with the weight of the rider on their backs. The blind-folding is done by slipping a small canvas bag over their heads, when they become perfectly tame and docile and will permit anyone to climb on them, as they believe when their heads are hidden that they are safe from all harm. Their speed is remarkable, and it is an easy task for a full-grown ostrich to attain the remarkable speed of thirty miles an hour with a weight of 100 pounds on its back.

The Askin-Singer company will send at least two of their most successful musical comedies to the coast in the early autumn—"The Girl Question" and "The Time, the Place and the Girl," which may be followed later on by "A Stubborn Cinderella" and "The Honey-moon Trail."

JUDGE SEEKS ARREST OF CO-RESPONDENT

Jersey Jurist Declares Men Proved Guilty in Divorce Cases Should Be Prosecuted Criminally by Authorities

NEWARK, N. J., July 25.—Vice-Chancellor Howell declared the county prosecutor should take criminal action against proved co-respondents in divorce cases. The action was one in which two families were broken up, according to testimony given by Christopher M. Scardulla, who sued his wife, Mercedes S., for divorce, naming William Yates.

THE cost of double tracking the line from Omsk to Atchinsk is estimated exclusive of transportation of goods which necessitates no cash expense, at \$3,019,000 rubles, or about \$15,000,000. This means a cost of 27,700 rubles per verst over the distance of 123 versts (a verst is 3500 feet). The cost of the second track on the Trans-Balkal sections will be heavier: from Irkutsk to Lake Balkal and from Teuchal to Manchuria 48,140,000 rubles are needed for the 1235 versts, or an average of 39,000 rubles per verst.

The same rate per verst is also given for the section of the line to Karymskaja. The expense of installing an additional track on the Atchinsk-Irkutsk section, together with reconstruction of which necessitates no cash expense, of transportation of material, 57,148,900 rubles. This sum brings the cost of the unaltered line to 31,150 rubles and of the rebuilt line to \$3,400 rubles per verst. Aside from all this, some 3,000,000 rubles are wanted to better the ferry system across Lake Balkal.—Harvard's Weekly.
