SIXTEEN WHITE SHIPS DROP ANCHOR

VOYAGE FROM SAN FRANCISCO TAKES 33 DAYS

AUCKLAND, N. Z., Aug. 9.—Sixteen white ships, comprising the battleship division of the United States Atlantic fleet under command of Rear Admiral Charles S. TELEGRAPH OPERATOR GOES INSANE; FEARS AIRSHIP

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—E. E. Beach, a telegraph operator who was a passenger on the steamer Homer, which arrived today from Portland, went suddenly insane on the trip and is now in the detention ward in the Central emergency hospital. Beach imagined that the vessel was being attacked by an airship and became so violent that he terrorized the entire ship before he was secured and bound. It took six strong men to subdue him. He is said to be a resident of Portland.
