TENDERS ADVICE ON AMENDMENTS

CITY CLUB'S COMMITTEE RENDERS REPORT

URGES DEFEAT FOR MOST OF THE PROPOSALS

Only Measures Deemed to be of Interest of Californians Are Those Known as Nos. 3, 28, 29, 32 and 33

Because of the long speeches and arguments at the City club session yesterday at the Westminster no action was taken on the report of the special committee which digested the proposed constitutional amendments.

Defeat No. 1

"No. 1—This amendment proposes a radical change in our tax system. The separation of state and local taxation is provided for and an attempt made to have the state revenue paid by a tax on the gross revenue of public utility corporations and a tax on banks and trust companies.

"Amendment No. 14, increasing the salaries of the state officers, is, in the main, a good amendment, but it contains a proviso increasing the salary of the lieutenant governor from \$980 to \$16,000 for the four years, without providing for any increase in the salaries of other officers.


"Senate amendment No. 26, repealing the section of the constitution assessing mortgages as a part of the real estate, in the opinion of the committee should be defeated.

allow business concerns to arrange for a continuance of their existence. This present amendment, however, does not provide that laws which have been passed since the original articles of incorporation shall apply to the corporations who take advantage of this provision, and it seems only just that such a provision should be included in such a law.

"On the whole, your committee believe that the interests of the state will be best served by the defeat of this amendment."

"Senate amendment No. 22 has already been favorably recommended by the committee."

"Senate amendment No. 23, relating to world's fair exhibits, seems a desirable amendment, and your committee recommend its adoption."

"Senate amendment No. 24 seeks to reorganize the state board of education. It is a step toward bringing the government more into the hands of the people, and your committee recommend its hearty support."

ASKS VETERANS TO VOTE AS THEY SHOT

COMRADE SAYS DUTY CALLS DEMOCRACY

Bryan a Second Lincoln Who Will Free the American People from Monopoly's Shackles and G. O. P. Grafters

SATTERWHITE IS FIGHTING PERKINS

OPPOSES MACHINE TO SAVE SAN PEDRO HARBOR

"Remember the Children" is Slogan of Republican Reck's Opponent for Legislature—Makes Speech in Sixth Ward

John W. Satterwhite, assembly candidate, made his closing speech in the Sixth ward yesterday before a large audience on Santee street yesterday. He said:

"One of the most important matters coming before the next legislature will be the election of a United States senator to succeed George C. Perkins."

"My Republican opponent is pledged to vote for Mr. Perkins for re-election, and I am pledged to work and vote for a man who is not controlled in any way by the railroad corporations and trusts; a man who, when elected, will represent the whole people, and not the favored few; a man who will not grant special privileges to the powerful money barons and ignore the rights of their poor and helpless constituents."

"We have not been represented in the halls of congress and the state legislature for years, although men have been sent there for that purpose."

"The time has come when the people are aroused, and when the votes are counted Tuesday you will find that men will have been elected to office who are pledged to represent the people and their constituents, and not the Southern Pacific railroad."

"San Pedro harbor must be saved to the people, and not go into the control of a railroad commission, which will be the case if the Southern Pacific machine candidates are elected."

"Graft and the enormous expense of running the state legislature, with which the taxpayer has been burdened must be stopped. This patronage grab and the terrific cost to the people entailed thereby should be reduced by 75 per cent; it is not necessary to have a swarm of clerks and attaches to run the business of the legislature."

"I am in favor of free text books for the school children of this state, and while we are speaking of children, it will be a Godsend to this country and the generations to come when a law passed putting a stop forever to child labor."

"The millions of children working in this country today to help support the family is an everlasting disgrace."

"Why is it that under the so-called prosperity of the last few years these children have to work? the fathers are unable under the present wage scale and the high price of trust manufactured commodities and necessities of life to support their families, to keep their children in school and feed and clothe them as they should."

"The benefits of the high protective tariff goes to the railroads, to the trusts and the manufacturer, in enabling them to charge a higher price for freight rates and their manufactured goods which the consumer has to pay."
