

BURGLARS BLOW SAFE, GET \$370

WRECK VAULT NEAR POLICE PATROL BOX
BIG CHARGE OF NITRO-GLYCERINE USED
Detectives Confident Job Was Done by Gang of Cracksmen Which Has Been Active in This Vicinity

The safe in the saloon of J. Gioia, 501 Buena Vista street, was blown some time last night by a large charge of nitro-glycerine. Three hundred dollars in cash, \$36 in checks and \$5 in postage stamps were taken.

In addition to rifling the compartments of the iron strong box, the robbers opened the cash register and secured \$5 in silver.

The robbery was not detected until early yesterday morning. The safe is in the southwest corner of the office and is in full view of the street.

The police say the job was done by persons familiar with the habits of the officers patrolling that beat, as the safe is situated not more than fifty feet from the patrol box, where patrolmen report every thirty minutes.

From the manner in which the safe was wrecked, detectives are confident the work is that of the same gang which has committed other recent burglaries of a similar nature.

Sounds Were Muffled
The combination dial was knocked off and the explosive poured in the aperture. The cracks around the door were filled with common brown soap and the charge exploded.

The men gained entrance to the saloon by breaking a lock on a rear gate, and forcing a rear door with a "jimmy," entered the place. After pouring the nitro-glycerine around the safe door, the men went to a feed house nearby and brought several sacks of grain, which they piled around the iron box. This accounts for the noise of the explosion being muffled.

The police were notified soon after Gioia saw the wrecked vault upon opening his place of business about 5 o'clock. Detectives Hawley and McKenzie are working on the case.

DORY FLEET TO SAIL IN PACIFIC WATERS

ASK COUNCIL TO AID IN BUILDING SEWERS FOR 'OUTFALL' PIER

PROPERTY OWNERS PETITION FOR RELIEF
Lake Shore Avenue Residents Claim Improvement Was Intended Also for Benefit of Edendale and Vicinity

Property owners in the assessment district of the trunk line sewer on Lake Shore avenue have asked the council to bear a part of the burden of constructing this sewer.

They represent that the Lake Shore avenue sewer is intended as much for the benefit of Edendale and that part of the city as for their own immediate advantage, and assert that it was one of the sewers projected to connect with the outfall when the people voted the sewer bonds.

The sewer bond money was all spent on the outfall, and nothing was left to construct the trunk lines to connect with it. These trunk lines are now being laid and the property owners are being assessed for their cost.

Members of the council told the property owners they had every right in the world to make the demand, but that there were many other sections in the same predicament, and that if the council established the precedent of paying a portion of the cost of the Lake Shore avenue sewer it would have to pay for many more like it.

COUNCIL COMMITTEE TO INSPECT FURNACE

Patent Pre-Heated Air Oil Device May Be Adopted by City if Company Will Give the Required Guarantee

The hot air committee of the city council, Wallace and Dromgold, with "Pop" Blanchard to act as a sort of exhaust muffler and smoke consumer, will form a special board to make a tour of inspection of the Mason Smokeless Combustion company's pre-heated air oil furnaces.

The city expects to install several furnaces, and it was at the suggestion of the board of public works that the committee was named.

The boiler inspector told the board that he did not particularly recommend this style of furnace, but suggested that a proposition be submitted to this company. This proposition is to guarantee a saving of a certain percentage of fuel oil consumed in a stated time, this saving to be the equivalent of the cost of installing the furnace and subsequent repairs due to the burning out of furnace walls.

The council committee will make this proposal to the Mason company and it is believed it will be accepted.

PLACE EMERGENCY ORDER FOR WORK ON AQUEDUCT

Drill Steel and Shanks Amounting to Thousands of Dollars Urgently Needed by Men Boring Tunnel

The aqueduct commission has ordered two carloads of drill steel at 15 cents a pound and 1600 blank drill shanks at \$1.50 each, from the Pacific Coast Manufacturing company.

This was placed as an emergency order by authority granted by the council, as the tunnel borers on the aqueduct are badly in need of the material.

It was explained by the board of public works that these drills were to be used in boring the tunnel, and that these could be purchased only of one company. Therefore it would be a farce and would greatly hamper the work to advertise for bids. This order will amount to thousands of dollars.

COL EDDY COMPELLED TO SUBMIT TO AMPUTATION

The many friends of Colonel J. W. Eddy of the Angels Flight railway will be sorry to learn that he was forced to undergo an operation for the amputation of his right foot at the Clara Barton hospital yesterday. About a year ago a needle entered his foot. An X ray was used to locate the needle but the ray was focused too near the foot and severe burns were the result. The colonel has undergone several operations in the hope of curing the burn, but in vain, and it was decided to resort to amputation. Colonel Eddy resides at the Hill Crest.
