ST. LOUIS, Nov. 5.—Returns compiled at 2:30 a. m. from every county in the state give Bryan a lead over Taft in Missouri of sixty-seven votes.

Indications are that the Democrats will control the legislature on joint ballot by four or five votes. The Republicans, however, have not given up hope of controlling the legislature and there is a possibility that Lieutenant Governor McKinley will be the next senator from Missouri, giving the state two Republicans in the upper house of congress.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Returns received in a late hour tonight indicate that William H. Taft of Ohio, as president-elect, will have a vote of 309 in the electoral college.

Depends on Missouri If Missouri votes for Taft, his total may reach 237. News of the late returns indicate that Maryland, after vacillating during the day and apparently being swung safe for the Democrats, has been swung into the Taft column.

Rest Are His All the rest of the states are safely for Taft with the exception of Maryland and Missouri, where the issue is so close that an official count may be necessary finally to determine the result.

Hughes' Plurality Governor Charles E. Hughes was re-elected in New York state by 71,150. Taft carried Ohio by 50,000 plurality, a reduction of more than 200,000 from the Roosevelt vote of four years ago.

Legislature Democratic The legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Teller, is also apparently Democratic.
