

'PARTY UNITED,' DECLARES MACK

DEFEAT OF BRYAN DUE TO MISREPRESENTATION

SAYS COMMONER MADE MOST MAGNIFICENT FIGHT

Democratic National Chairman Discusses Failure of His Party and Finds Solace in Several Features

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Declaring that the Democratic party is more united today than it has been in many years and that Mr. Bryan was defeated by what he claims was the misrepresentation to the effect that his election would have "hurt business interests," Chairman Mack of the Democratic national committee this afternoon issued a statement in which he announces extensive plans to advance the party's interest during the next four years.

Mr. Mack's statement in full follows: "There is not much for me to say, and no apologies to make relative to the victory of the Republican party. "Mr. Bryan made the most magnificent fight ever waged by a candidate. The party was made the victim of misrepresentation—a misrepresentation that Democratic success would retard the business interests of the country. That was, of course, an argument without foundation.

"Notwithstanding yesterday's defeat the Democratic party stands more united today than it has in many years, and in this union lies its future strength and power of recuperation. To Continue Work "It is my intention to continue headquarters in Buffalo and Washington for the next four years to keep in touch with the people in all the states and to promulgate Democratic principles and literature to aid the leaders of the party in fighting the high tariff, which, in all probability, the Republicans will continue, notwithstanding their promise to revise it.

"I am supported in this by the members of the national committee, state chairman and other leaders all over the country. "In his own state—Nebraska—where he is best known, Mr. Bryan was victorious. While it is true he met with defeat in the nation, he did so as the candidate of his party, supported by the six million or seven million of his countrymen, he so splendidly espoused and with the respect and admiration of them."

HEARST TICKET GETS BUT 746 VOTES IN BAY CITY

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—The total vote cast in San Francisco was 61,597, divided on the presidential election as follows: Taft, 38,119; Bryan, 21,237; Hiseign, 746; Debs, 413; Chaffin, 23. This gives Taft a plurality of 11,882.

For supreme judge Murasky (Dem.) has a plurality of 12,214 over Melvin (Rep.).

In the Fourth congressional district Kahn (Rep.) leads Maguire (Dem.) by 1644.

In the Fifth congressional district Hayes (Rep.) has a plurality of 48 over Tracy (Dem.).

The Republicans elect four of the five superior court judges, Judge Deming, on whom the judgeship fight centered, was elected over Carroll Cook by 1623 votes.

The legislative ticket stands twelve Republicans and six Democrats in the assembly; four Republicans and one Democrat in the senate.

SAN DIEGO'S FULL VOTE IS 3000 PLURALITY FOR TAFT

SAN DIEGO, Nov. 4.—With the returns on the head of the ticket all in one except five small precincts with a total registration of but 57 to hear from, the city is practically a unit. County Chairman Stearns claimed it would be 3000 plurality for Taft.

The totals are: Taft, 3333; Lewis, 2363; Taft's plurality, 970. Debs' vote has fallen about 400 below what he polled four years ago, but his vote is missing from several precincts so that exact figures cannot be given.

The vote for Smith for congress is only about 1 per cent below that for Taft, and for Melvin it is little behind the Smith figures.

E. C. Hinkle is chosen assemblyman from the city district by 690 majority, and Percival Johnson is elected in the Eighth district by 890, with Imperial to hear from.

TAFT'S TO BETTER NATION SAYS HE SHALL WORK FOR ITS SUCCESS

DECLARES TRADE, LABOR AND AGRICULTURE WITH HIM

President-Elect Will Leave Friday for Hot Springs, Va., Where He Goes to Get Complete Rest

[By Associated Press.] CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 4.—William H. Taft gave hearty expression today to the gratification he felt on his election as president of the United States. "Business labor and agriculture," he declared, "will be the success of the country if his ability and energy could make it so.

"Please say I am perfectly healthy, but tired," was the message Judge Taft sent to those seeking interviews. With Mrs. Taft he has enjoyed the hospitality of Charles F. Taft at the latter's family mansion today, going out only once, and then to receive the plaudits of his fellow townsmen as they lined the streets and filled the windows for blocks to witness the parade of the Woodward high school pupils, faculty and trustees.

Mr. Taft made the principal address at the coronation laying of the new building of the school, from which he was graduated when a boy. The function gave the citizens an opportunity to pay their first tributes to the president-elect and full advantage was taken. Judge Taft did not refer to the election or to politics in his brief address, but confined himself to the history of the school, which he laid for him many fond memories.

A speech to the Women's Foreign Mission society of the Methodist Episcopal church, in annual session here, tomorrow morning, and a banquet of the Cincinnati Commercial club tomorrow night constitute the public functions which will occupy Judge Taft before he leaves for Hot Springs, Va., Friday. "I am going away for a complete rest of at least two weeks," said Judge Taft tonight.

"I am not going to hold political conferences, neither am I going to consider cabinet construction or appointments during this time. It is so quiet as I can make it." Three thousand or more telegrams of congratulation have been delivered to Judge Taft today. Many came from business organizations and labor societies.

BOURSE SCARED; STOCKS WEAKEN. EVEN ELECTION OF TAFT FAILS TO QUIET NERVES OF PARIS PLUNGERS—CASA BLANCA INCIDENT CAUSES TROUBLE. PARIS, Nov. 4.—The generally good impression upon financial sentiment in this city produced by the election of Taft has been more than offset, at least temporarily, by the renewed anxiety over the attitude adopted by Germany in the matter of the Casa Blanca incident.

FRANCE ACCEPTED THIS PROPOSAL, PROVIDED THE ARBITRATION SHOULD COVER THE QUESTION WHETHER OR NOT GERMANY INSPIRED THE DESERTION IN QUESTION. GERMANY REFUSED THIS COUNTER OFFER, AND FRANCE HAS DECLINED TO MODIFY HER ATTITUDE.

ALARM ON THE BOURSE. This situation created alarm on the bourse this morning, which opened excited and lower, but a gradual calmness settled, but the usual measure of calling the German federal council together to consider the political situation continued to hang over the market.

THE CONVICTION, HOWEVER, THAT TAFT'S ELECTION MEANS A RESUMPTION OF PROSPERITY IN AMERICA WITH THE CONSEQUENT REFLECTION IN EUROPE, TURNED PRICES UPWARD IN THE MIDDLE OF THE SESSION.

THE BOURSE WEAKENED AGAIN AT THE CLOSING OF THE MARKET, AS GERMANY HAD DEMANDED THE RECALL OF THE FRENCH CONSUL AT CASA BLANCA. NO CONFIRMATION OF THIS REPORT, HOWEVER, COULD BE OBTAINED.

AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT MADE PUBLIC THIS AFTERNOON SET FORTH THAT FRANCE INTENDS TO INSIST FIRMLY UPON ARBITRATION, BOTH IN THE MATTER OF THE LAW AND THE FACTS IN THE RECALL OF THE FRENCH CONSUL AT CASA BLANCA. SHE WILL MAKE NO APOLOGY FOR THE ACTIONS OF THE FRENCH OFFICERS AT CASA BLANCA UNLESS THE ARBITRATORS DECIDE THAT AN APOLOGY IS DUE.
