

STANFORD AGAIN BEATS BERKELEY

MAKES FIFTH CONSECUTIVE VICTORY
CARDINALS SHOW GRATLY SUPERIOR TEAM

Greatest Crowd That Ever Witnessed Annual Game Between Rival Universities Attends and Enthusiasm is Great

BERKELEY, Nov. 14.—For the fifth consecutive time the football team of Stanford university has defeated the University of California, the score today being 12 to 3.

In almost every department of the Rugby game the Cardinal men outplayed their opponents, and throughout the struggle was a desperate one on the part of an inferior team against a better one.

California's lone score was made in the first half. Stanford here scored six of her dozen points, adding the other six in the second portion.

YALE DEFEATS TIGERS, 11 TO 6

CHANCE IN WINNER'S LINE UP EFFECTIVE

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 14.—Princeton closed an inglorious football season with a defeat at the hands of Yale today, 11 to 6.

With Yale it was a different story. Entering a contest for the first time since the sweeping victory of the team after the Brown game last Saturday, there was some anxiety in the Yale camp as to the outcome today, but as the contest progressed the work of Yale improved.

Princeton fought bitterly to avoid the impending disaster, but the flesh was weak. When near the end of the second half, Captain Dillon, Princeton's great little leader, was carried from the field fighting and crying like a child, the heart seemed to be taken out of his followers.
