ORANGE CROP ESTIMATED TEN PER CENT GREATER

POMONA, Dec. 14.—P. J. Dreher of the San Antonio fruit exchange gives it as his opinion that the orange crop in this valley this season will be 10 per cent greater than it was last year, when the shipments of citrus fruits amounted to 2100 cars. Of this amount the 'San Antonio exchange, which is composed of the exchanges at Pomona, North Pomona, Claremont and San Dimas, handled 1715 carloads, 1021 being sent from this city and North Pomona.

SAN PEDRO ELECTION CASE AGAIN DELAYED

[Special to The Herald.] SAN PEDRO, Dec. 14.—In the hearing this morning in the district court of appeals at Los Angeles in the matter of the writ of mandate to compel the election for the purpose of deciding whether the city shall divide at Fifth street, but little apparently was accomplished.

The demurrer to the answer, filed by Judge J. W. McKinley and City Attorney Henry Stieglitz last week, was denied, Judge H. M. Barstow, representing the plaintiffs, conceding the only issue in the validity and sufficiency of the petition. A tangle arose over the attempt of the attorneys for the city to bring into the case the question of East San Pedro being a part of the territory to be divided.

The court finally ordered a map showing the territory which it was intended by the petitioners to exclude to be filed in the case, which was continued until next Monday.

To show how carefully the attorneys in the Long Beach-San Pedro controversy over the case, which was argued by Judge Barstow a year ago and which restrained San Pedro from exercising jurisdiction in this territory.

According to records, this injunction was asked for by Long Beach December 18, 1907, and, according to the law, the injunction is dissolved after twelve months, if nothing has been done in the case in the interim, which was the case here.

It was a surprise to both Judge McKinley and Attorney Stieglitz, who, in addition to defending the trustees in the present case, are the attorneys for the city of San Pedro in the Long Beach cases.
