THE usual class is involved in the offering of Manager McCarey at his popular-price card tonight at Naud Junction, and an added interest is lent to the offering by reason of the fact that Fighting Dick Hyland, who will battle with Kid Dalton over the ten-round course, is matched with Packy McFarland for a January date and match with scrap tonight in a decisive manner to make the match a certainty. In addition to the main event card there will be three preliminary bouts, two at ten rounds and one at six, and an exceptionally strong card is offered in this regard. Naturally, interest will center in the main event, because it will be the first appearance here of Dick Hyland since his memorable scrap with Cyclone Thompson. Hyland is a topnotch lightweight of excellent class and all his championship pretensions are backed by a highly creditable record in fighting and against good boys. Despite his class and prominence, however, he is stacking up against an awful tough proposition in Kid Dalton. The latter has just returned here from a long fighting trip to the north, where he knocked out all his opponents except Thompson.

Dalton wants to go to the top of the heap and is not a bit scared by the reputation of Hyland. A little experience away north have made Dalton more confident and have polished him off to a degree that makes him a more dangerous proposition than heretofore, when he was a pork-and-bean champion here. He is a real scrapper now and hopes to prove tonight that he has some class. Hyland, on the other hand, is rather remarkable if he should knock out Hyland, yet he proposes to make the attempt. In the event that he should do so regardless of how he fetched the proposition, however, he will become some pumpkins in the fight game.

Both boys have been training hard for the scrap and are in excellent condition for a grueling battle. They are down to weight, having agreed to do the lightweight limit at 6 o'clock this evening, and the weightmaking stunt has not affected their condition. Dalton will be fit to put up the best fight of which he is capable, and is in better trim than when he stood off Frankie Carney for twenty-five rounds. BAD SPILL HAS NO SERIOUS RESULTS

JOCKEYS SHAKEN UP, BUT ARE OTHERWISE UNHURT

Gemmell Comes to Life Long Enough to Annex Observatory Handicap After Running in His Old-Time Form

The first accident of the season at Santa Anita occurred in the first race yesterday, when Lee Harrison II, the Sultan and Ails fell on the back stretch, throwing their jockeys and probably interfering with the result of the race in some otherwise would have obtained. Lee Harrison II, ridden by Archibald, stumbled on the back stretch turn and went to his knees. The Sultan, ridden by Page, and Ails, ridden by Schilling, fell over him. Gemmell and the Prince drew away from the others at once and the race was between them all the way. Prince passed Gemmell at half and held the lead to the paddock gate, where they hooked up heads on for the drive to the wire. ALASKA TO MEXICO ROUTE OF MOTORIST. SEATTLE, Dec. 17.—From the Klondike to the City of Mexico and return in an automobile is the trip on which Stanley Searce, a rich merchant of Dawson, who arrived here yesterday, is bent on making before the end of April. Two years ago he purchased a machine to attend to his business in the Klondike. Last spring he drove it over the Yukon river 100 miles in less than a day, the machine climbing ice jams and riding over the rough ice with ease. After criss-crossing California he will go over the roads passable in Mexico and then by the shortest possible routes come back to Seattle. He will ship the machine from here to Whittier, and on April 10 start on a 375-mile trip over the ice to Dawson.
