OAKLAND, Dec. 28.—Probably the greatest ovation ever tendered a jockey at a local track was given at Emeryville today when Robert Harrington, a 32-pound boy, won on Em and Em, a 50 to 1 shot, owned by James Coffey, his employer. The little boy rode hard all the way and landed the outsider in front in a drive from Miss May Bowditch and Phil Igoe. The spectators thronged about the judges' stand and cheered Harrington until he reached the paddock after he had dismounted. He is the lightest rider here, and it was his first winning mount.
