Entre Nous, Joe Coyne and Lord of the Forest Upset Calculations of the Talent in Their Events

Popular choices more than held their own with the long-shot winners yesterday at Santa Anita and everybody was happy after the last race was run. Entre Nous, once a high class sprinter but more recently showing poor form, won the opening event in a hard drive with Lady Irma, the speediest triek shown hereabouts this season. Lady probably would have won had the distance been a sixteenth shorter, but at seven furlongs she found the distance entirely too extended. At that, she hung on gamely and was beaten only in the final furlong by the good entry. Only a few days ago she set a new world record for five and a half furlongs, and on this showing was heavily played to beat good sprinters over the longer route. She set a dizzy pace for six furlongs and then began to tire, but it was all that Entre Nous could do to beat her for first money at the wire. Grande Dame, from the St. James stable, showed.

Lee Rose, which was figured as the best chance of the day, was opened in the market at an exceedingly short price, and under a plunge by the big bettors his price roared to about the shortest odds laid this season. He fully justified these odds by winning in a gallop from Lawton Wiggin and Emperor William, after a hard struggle for half a mile. Hasty Agnes, which has been running right up amongst the first three all season, and in better company than that which she faced yesterday, had no trouble in defeating Norbitt and Huey at a mile in 1:28. Hasty was away nicely and showed much more foot for the others, never being in trouble at any stage of the game. It was no trouble to Golly Ding to win the fourth race in seven furlongs. Golly found the company dead easy and distance was no drawback, so she simply came along when asked to run and won without much of an effort and in good time. 


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Course of Marathon Race, Herald Cup Offered as Trophy and Last Contestant Who Entered for Event

CHANGES WORRY YACHTING MEN

MEASUREMENT RULES PROVE AWKWARD PROBLEM

Members of South Coast Dory Association Much Exercised Over Announcement That Uniformity Is Compulsory

Members of the South Coast Yacht club are much concerned over the proposed changes in the rules of measurement presented by the eastern conference last October. The South Coast Yacht club is practically the only one on the Pacific coast which sails according to the rules adopted by the eastern conference.

The main change in the measurement proposed is in the method of measuring the "L." According to the proposed plan it will be taken from the water line. Members of the club who have contemplated building new boats are waiting until the discussion is definitely settled before deciding their plans. They naturally desire to build their boats so as to secure the utmost advantage under the rules.

In case the proposed new rules are adopted Walter Folsom probably will not build his new sixty-foot racer, which he has been planning for some time. His Mischief II will answer all requirements under the new rules and he will be given handicaps which will insure him a fair advantage in races with larger boats.

Several launches for business purposes are being built by the Fulton Marine Construction company and will be turned out complete in the next few weeks. Joe Fellows is also busy constructing and remodeling several work boats.

Members of the South Coast Dory association are at daggers' points over the decision of the committee in charge to enforce rigidly the rule requiring boats to be uniform in every particular. There are many points of contention which arise from an effort at making a uniform rule for a class of sailing boats.

The first race of the winter season several of the boats had their masts raked aft, which seemed to give them an advantage over the rest. Sail measurements are a particularly sore point of discussion. Some of the sails have stretched more than have others and some boats have a larger sail area by several feet than others. These slight differences will make a difference of a few minutes over a long course of several miles and may lose the race.

Then certain owners have been greasing their boats to overcome the resistance of the water. This undoubtedly makes a difference of a few seconds in each mile sailed. These are only a few of the technical and difficult points which the regatta committee is trying to settle in a manner satisfactory to all owners.

Joe Fellows has sent east for a new sail outfit. He is also having his boat sanded and repainted, in order to make the hull smoother. It is likely that other owners will follow his example.

CHAMPION WRESTLERS WILL DEFEND TITLES

LOS ANGELES ATHLETIC CLUB TO HOLD CONTEST

Former Victors Will Meet New Aspirants in January—Many Men Now in Training for Event

Amateur wrestling champions of Southern California in the lightweight, middle and welterweight and heavyweight classes will defend their titles against many aspirants at the Los Angeles Athletic club prize championship wrestling contest to be held January 20 in the gymnasium of the club at 534 South Spring street.

The coming event will be one of the best and most important wrestling contests ever held in Southern California. The men who are in training will not know with whom they are to be matched until the night of the bouts, when they will draw lots. Any competitor is likely to draw any other man in his class.

One match will settle things for some of the wrestlers, while others may have to down several competitors before weeding the contestants down to the champions.

In the lightweight class, 135 pounds and under, George Retzer has the reputation of being the cleverest little wrestler in the club, but the men watched against him are showing splendid form and one of them may be successful in carrying away the championship honors.

Middle and welterweights will be grouped, and this class will contain the largest number of entries. Harvey Hicks is the Southern California welterweight champion and George W. Isaacs holds the Southern California championship in the middleweight class. Anyone weighing from 135 to 155 pounds can find a place in this class.

Isaacs and Hicks will have no walk-over, judging from the men who are to be matched against them. Arthur Howard is the dark horse in this class. He weighs 155 pounds, and has a wonderfully strong grip. While not so experienced as the champions, he is not an unlikely winner. He is sure to give his adversaries a hard tussle.

Allen Davenport and E. C. Price are showing excellent form and progress and are made of championship material. A number of well known and powerful wrestlers are entered in the heavyweight class, and there is the widest speculation as to the probable winner. W. E. Parker is a new man in the heavyweight class. He weighs 175 pounds and is said by Mr. Treloar to be the strongest wrestler in the club. With a little science drilled into him between now and the date of the contest he will make a good showing against the more experienced wrestlers.

THIRTY CRACK RUNNERS TO START IN GREAT NEW YEAR'S MARATHON

FAST DISTANCE MEN TO COMPETE IN FIFTEEN-MILE RACE FROM LOS ANGELES TO VENICE

Time of Last Year's Event Likely to Be Materially Shortened by Well Trained Athletes Who Will Be Off at Crack of Pistol This Morning—Records Made During Practice Jealously Guarded

BRIEF EXTRACT FROM RULES

"The competitors will be followed by an equal number of officials. "Any runner who impedes the progress of any other competitor will be disqualified, as arranged in regard to other races. In the same way any runner who shall have endeavored to shorten the course by cutting across or by using any other means of locomotion will be disqualified.

At the place of each runner is determined by lot. A runner is entitled to be followed by a person carrying a medical certificate or one commissioned to render him first medical assistance during the course of the race. This person may under no circumstances precede the runner and the latter is immediately disqualified should the follower have impeded the progress of a competitor."

Thirty trained sinewy athletes gathered from every part of the country, every man of them ready to make the effort of his life, will line up in front of the Los Angeles Athletic club at 9:30 o'clock this morning, when Robert A. Rowan fires the gun to start them on the long run to Venice. The contests in line will represent the finest long distance racing material ever gathered together for a Marathon contest in the west. Most of the runners have records behind them, and the pace which they will take and maintain throughout the race will be a heart breaker. Not only are the men experienced runners but they know every foot of the course of today's race and have gone over it time and again, planning their campaign and timing themselves for the distance until each man knows just what he can do and what time he can make. Records made during the past few weeks of training have been jealously guarded by most of the contestants, but many of them do not hesitate in saying they believe they can run the race in 1:45, or fifteen minutes under that made last race.

Many persons who have watched the men during months of hard consistent training are not backward in asserting that they believe a record will be made today for the whole United States. Ed Dietrich covered the distance of fifteen and one-half miles in September in 2:01:30 and was first winner of The Herald cup which is to be awarded to the winner of three consecutive races.

Stanley Confident William Stanley of San Francisco claims to have made the run in 1:55 without exerting himself. Stanley holds the record for long distance walk San Francisco to Los Angeles. If confidence can help a man to win Stanley will be in first at the finish. Ed Dietrich, winner of the last Marathon, is still the favorite of many. He certainly demonstrated that he has great abilities as a runner and he says he is in better condition now than last September.

H. L. Becker of Coronado, who has been training for two months on the beach at San Diego, feels that he will have no trouble in winning today's contest. He has taken part in many Marathon contests with famous racers and knows what he can do.

Henry W. Wheeler, veteran walker of many years' experience, regards himself as a sure winner. Although 50 years of age, Wheeler is in the pink of physical condition and will make the youngsters hustle. He took part in the Mount Wilson hill climb in 1907.

Another veteran of the Mount Wilson event and a man who has won places in several long distance contests in this country and on the continent is Paul Reinwald.

Boscha Favorite Charles Boscha is a general favorite with members of the Los Angeles Athletic club who have watched him train. His second place in the last Marathon to Venice. He is in splendid condition and will be able to make better time than in the previous race.

Joseph K. Korinek comes from Chicago with a record of having made good time records in many eastern Marathon contests. He will represent the Monticello Athletic club of his native city.

Germans are backing Frank Rosenauer, the Turner athlete, and no one can deny that the Turnverein representative shows up well in preliminary training.
