BUILDING AGENTS TO BE ARRESTED

GUENTHART AND ROWLINSON SOUGHT BY OFFICERS

Woman Alleges She Was Defrauded Out of Several Hundred Dollars by Members of Security Company

Steps looking to the discovery of the whereabouts of Charles B. Guenthart, missing president of the Security Building company, have been taken by the district attorney's office, and if he can be found he will be returned to Los Angeles to face prosecution on a charge of embezzlement, made against him yesterday by Mrs. George Stephan.

Charles Rowlinson, employed by Guenthart to dispose of stock in a newly organized corporation, is also wanted to answer to a charge of false representation in connection with the Stephan case. Complaints against the two men have been issued by Deputy District Attorney Ford.

Later the same day Rowlinson reappeared and asked for a third payment, offering a discount of 2 percent if paid in advance. Mrs. Stephan, believing the proposition was a good one, accepted, Rowlinson saying the money would be returned to her if her husband objected to the transaction.

OLD COLONIST RATES WILL BE RESTORED

Railroads Entering Los Angeles Decide to Encourage Travel Despite Opposition of Transcontinental Association

California railroads have decided to place in effect the old colonist rates from the middle west in order to accelerate tourist travel. The Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and Salt Lake roads finally decided on this action yesterday in the face of opposition by the Transcontinental Passenger association, which opposes the low colonist rates because it does not wish to see the people drawn away from the east.
