Judge Says It Is Unmanly to Drag Father, Mother, Wife or Children of Defendant into Trial

SAN FRANCISCO, March 27.—Stirred by the presence in court of a white-haired, partially paralyzed father, Judge Frank H. Dunne of the superior court turned from the case before him today long enough to declare that the practice of dragging into trials mothers, fathers, little children or any other kindred whose presence might work on the sympathies of court or jury savored of unmanliness and cowardice on the part of the defendants.

INDIANS AT WAR KILL TWO MEN

REDSKINS RESIST EFFORT TO ARREST CHIEF

STATE TROOPS OF OKLAHOMA ARE CALLED OUT

Posses of Officers and Twenty Creeks Engage in Pitched Battle, the Indians Firing First

GUTHRIE, Okla., March 27.—At the telephonic request of Sheriff Odum of McIntosh, Governor Haskell directed Adjutant General Stanton to assume charge of the situation and order the necessary militia to the scene of tonight's battle at Hickory Ground between officers and creek Indians.

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 27.—In a pitched battle at Hickory ground at 6 o'clock this evening between a posse of five officers and twenty Creek Indians of the Snake reservations, Edward Baum of Checotah was killed.

Frank Jones and William Carr, other members of the posse, escaped without injury and fled to the settlement, where the news of the battle was telephoned to Sheriff Odum of McIntosh county.

Frank Swift, a member of the posse of officers sent to the home of Chitt Harjo, chief of the Snake clan of the Creek Indians, to serve a warrant on the chief, was probably fatally wounded.

Herman Odum, son of the sheriff of McIntosh county, and Edward Baum, city marshal of Checotah, were killed outright.

Officers having heard that the Indians and negroes were again peaceable after the trouble Thursday morning, approached the cabin of Harjo near Hickory Ground without fear of trouble.

Odum and Baum fell dead, and Swift was seriously wounded. Jones ran a few yards and hid himself in a clump of trees until the Indians disappeared. Then he returned to the bodies of his comrades, finding them dead, he returned to Pierce.

Within thirty minutes after the report of the battle reached Checotah a hundred men were armed. Every available gun and practically all the ammunition in town were taken.

In an hour fifty men were marching toward Hickory Ground. The news reached Muskogee officers immediately issued a call for men, and a short time later a posse of fifty was ready to march.

From Henrietta and Weleetko men will also go tonight to Pierce, the place selected for mobilization. At 11 o'clock tonight Adjutant General Frank Frazier of Oklahoma National Guard wired Col. Roy Hoffman of Chandler to immediately call four companies of the state guard for mobilization.

Companies at Oklahoma City, Chandler, Muskogee and Durant probably will depart for Henrietta tonight.

A dispatch from Checotah says the Snake Indians have been purchasing rifles and ammunition there for a month and that they are supplied with powder and lead enough to last for two days.

Harjo, who has so often within the last two years expressed his displeasure at the restraint of law and who has often called his men into council for threatening officers of the law, is believed to have determined to make a final stand in behalf of his ideas of liberty.

When Sheriff Odum received from the district clerk at Eufaula today the warrant for the arrest of Harjo the clerk admonished him that he would have trouble.

NICARAGUAN STRIFE DUE TO SMUGGLERS

WAR SCARE IS EXPLAINED BY OFFICERS AT CORINTO

Steamship Captain at San Francisco Tells of Interviews on Southern Coast Relative to Manoeuvres

SAN FRANCISCO, March 27.—That the recent martial activity in the republic of Nicaragua was not a preparation for threatened wars with Salvador, as was commonly supposed, but was simply a movement to stamp out smuggling in the Gulf of Fonseca, was in effect the statement made to Captain Frazier of Nicaragua at Corinto.

On her trip down the coast the San Juan found Nicaraguan affairs in a turmoil, suggestive of impending war. Returning, she found the supposed war clouds scattered over the country settling down to a state of humdrum peace and quiet.

The Corinto officials, said Captain Frazier, lauded at the Fonseca, with Salvador and declared there never had been the slightest danger of a conflict.

The warlike preparations, they asserted, were solely for the purpose of proceeding against a band of smugglers that had for a long time operated in the Gulf of Fonseca.

Notable among these preparations was the transporting overland by rail of the small twin screw gunboat Angelina, which carries one-half of the Nicaraguan navy.

The Angelina was shipped from Managua, the capital, on the shore of an inlet on the southern coast, a distance of fifty miles, where she joined forces with the other half of Nicaragua's navy.

ANTI-OPIMUM LAW WILL BE ENFORCED APRIL 1

Term is Interpreted to Include All Forms of Oriental Narcotics

WASHINGTON, March 27.—After April 1 next neither opium nor any mixture or compound containing or representing opium in any form can legally be brought into the United States for any of the ordinary medicinal purposes.

This carries into effect a law passed at the last session of congress embodying this restriction, and the secretary of the treasury today issued regulations in which is indicated the term "opium," which shall cover all of its forms, including the following named alkalis, their salts or combinations as it may be found necessary to include in the future:

Morphine, codeine, doening, diacetyl, morphine heroin, peronine, their chlorides, sulphates, phosphates and all mixtures or preparations containing them. The term "for medicinal purposes only" is meant for the treatment or prevention of diseases of man or animal.

Smoking opium will be seized forthwith and destroyed as an illegal importation.

Opium other than smoking opium and its derivatives imported for medicinal purposes may be entered for immediate transportation in bond to and for consumption or for warehouse at the following named ports and no other cities: Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Detroit, Honolulu, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, Port of Spain, San Francisco, Seattle and St. Louis.

COLONEL GOETHALS GOES BACK TO PANAMA CANAL

Chief of Construction Declares Recent Slide Was Not Indicative of Weakness

NEW YORK, March 27.—Colonel Goethals left for the canal zone late tonight on the steamer Advance. Just before she sailed he alluded to the recent cave-in along the line of the Panama railroad near Gatun, and declared that the slide could not be held in any way to indicate danger to the dam construction.

"The railroad slide was due to a swamp," said Colonel Goethals, "which does not reach anywhere a point nearer than a mile and a half from the dam. I am just as certain now as ever that the Gatun dam structure has a soil that will be able to support it for ages."
