

DETECTIVE'S OFFICES AGAIN RAIDED AND STRONG-BOXES FORCED

SAFES OF CALHOUN DRILLED

Detectives Force Open Private Vaults of Accused Magnate DAY AN EXCITING ONE Officers Continue Raids of United Railroads' Headquarters IGNORE COURT ORDER Other Arrests Made and More Expected - Entire City Aroused

[By Associated Press.] SAN FRANCISCO, March 28.—Following the startling developments yesterday in the bribery graft cases, when five men, including the private secretary of William J. Burns and four officials of the United Railroads, were arrested in connection with the alleged bribing and copying of documents from the offices of Burns and the district attorney and the legal offices of the United Railroads, the private secretary of Patrick Calhoun and Thorne Mullaney, his assistant, were drilled open today and their contents carefully examined.

The forcing of the safes was a continuation of the search last night, when agents of the district attorney made a dramatic raid on the offices of the president of the United Railroads and followed Calhoun's refusal today to open them.

Just as the search was almost finished, Stanley Moore, of counsel for Calhoun, appeared with a restraining order, signed by Superior Judge Murasky, enjoining the agents and Calhoun and the district attorney from proceeding with their work.

Acting upon instructions from Assistant District Attorney Henry H. Burns refused to recognize the order of the court, and continued their search.

Another development of the day was the arrest of Francis J. Murphy, state counsel for Abraham Ruef during Ruef's second trial, who was recently tried and acquitted of the charge of attempting to bribe a juror on the Ruef panel.

WOMAN WHO DIES AT SUNRISE TODAY AT AUBURN PRISON

TO MEET DEATH IN CHAIR TODAY

MARY FARMER ELECTROCUTED AT SUNRISE Woman to Pay Penalty of Brutal Murder of Neighbor—Husband Also Sentenced—Passes Night Praying

[Special to The Herald.] AUBURN, N. Y., March 28.—Apparently indifferent to her fate, Mrs. Mary Farmer, who is to die in the electric chair at sunrise tomorrow for the killing of Mrs. Sarah Brennan at Brownsville, sat unmoved tonight in Auburn prison.

Mrs. Farmer was allowed to bid farewell to her husband today, and then was lodged in a cell that adjoins the

THRICE WOUNDS WIFE AND TURNS GUN ON HIMSELF

TRAGEDY HORRIFIES CROWD AT SIXTH AND MAIN FIRES THREE TIMES MORE AT PROSTRATE VICTIM

Jealous Husband Follows Murderous Attack by Attempt at Suicide and Falls Insensible in Drug Store

IN THE presence of hundreds of people, either passing by or waiting for cars, Edward G. Martin, a cook, 28 years of age, shot his wife, Georgetta Martin, aged 27 years, at the corner of Sixth and Main streets. He then shot himself. It is not believed that either Martin or his wife will die.

The shooting took place at 6:30 p. m. and was the result of jealousy on the part of Martin, who alleged that his wife had been with other men. This statement she denied at the receiving hospital.

Mrs. Martin was shot three times. The first bullet struck her in the left side of the neck and lodged in the spinal vertebrae about three inches below the base of the skull. The second bullet struck her in the back of the neck to the right of the spinal cord and lodged in the vertebrae.

At the corner and directly in front of the entrance to the Central building they were confronted by Martin. The two women and the man stood talking excitedly for a few minutes.

Staggering into the store, he called for aid, and a clerk gave him a stimulant. No one noticed the question of the man who pitched headlong to the floor, striking his head against a door jamb and cutting a gash in the scalp.

Meantime Mrs. Martin had been picked up and laid on the sidewalk. She was apparently dead, giving no signs of consciousness.

Dr. Chamberlain probed the wound in Martin's head and found that the bullet had passed through the skull and lodged in the brain tissue. It was extracted, the operation necessitating the removal of a portion of the inner table.

Mrs. Martin complained of a great deal of pain, and she is paralyzed in both arms and shoulders. She was given an opiate and placed in the hospital ward in the maternity department. Martin was placed on a cot and shackled to the foot of the bed. He seemed to wander in his mind at times, but the doctor is of the opinion that he is pretending to be crazy.

SECOND SON OF SERBIA'S RULER TO GET THRONE

RENUNCIATION OF THE CROWN PRINCE AVERTS WAR RUSSIA'S FOREIGN MINISTER BITTERLY DENOUNCED

Czar's Diplomat Accused of Treachery, Romanoffs Receive News with Rage and Shame - Also Blame Ambassador

ST. PETERSBURG, March 28.—The solution of the Balkan crisis has been received here with rage and shame rather than with a feeling of relief by the press and Chauvinistic public, which blame Foreign Minister Iswolsky for the surrender of Slav interests without considering the circumstances which have dictated the Russian policy.

Belgrade, March 28.—Crown Prince George's renunciation of the throne was read at the national assembly today, together with the letter from King Peter accepting the renunciation and declaring Prince Alexander, his second son, heir to the throne.

Agreement is Complete VIENNA, March 28.—A complete agreement has been reached by the powers with regard to the steps to be taken at Belgrade on the basis of the proposals made by Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary, to Baron von Aehrenthal, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, for the settlement of the difficulty between Austria and Serbia.

French Are Indignant PARIS, March 28.—The reverse inflicted on the Anglo-Franco-Russian alliance by the Austro-Hungarian-German combination in the Balkan negotiations has created much bitterness here.


TWENTY DROWN OFF NICARAGUA'S COAST

REDSKINS WAGE WAR DEFIANTLY

Son of Indian Chief Tortured Until He Betrays His Tribesmen

MANY CLASHES OCCUR Five Troops and Posses Attack Aborigines of Oklahoma

ONE BRAVE HANGED Belligerents Armed and Entrenched, Aided by Outlaw Negroes

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., March 28.—Chief Crazy Snake and 100 followers retreated before five companies of Oklahoma militia late tonight, thus deferring an expected battle until tomorrow.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., March 28.—Five companies of Oklahoma militia marched tonight against Crazy Snake's band of Creek Indians, half-breeds and negroes, entrenched in the Hickory hills, seven miles from Henryetta.

Takes Desperate Stand The wild old redskin apparently realized that he was in a tight place and prepared to make a desperate stand. This first real Indian rising in years was planned two months ago. It broke out last Thursday when some deputy sheriffs went to Henryetta to arrest negro cattle thieves.

Militia Encamped Darkness closed a day of unrest, uneasiness and desultory skirmishing throughout a large part of the former Creek nation.

Before leaving Henryetta, Colonel Hoffman made a request of Adjutant General Frank Cannon that 500 more members of the state troops be held in readiness for a call.

That there will be armed resistance by the Snakes is the opinion of the military, for it was learned this afternoon that the Indians had received 75,000

Col. Hoffman does not expect trouble until early tomorrow, but he message stated people of that part of the state had gone to the limit of endurance with the outlaw bands and must be given protection. Every armed Indian is to be arrested.

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
