Given Quick Trial. Finds Wife Dead. Mrs. Anna Zerenner, aged 56 years, wife of Carl Zerenner, was found dead at her home, 1708 Santee street by her husband who reported the death yesterday. Mr. Zerenner is employed at the Fred Detmer optical store. Aside from her husband, Mrs. Zerenner leaves one daughter, Mrs. Helen Greenland and Otto F. Harris, a son by a former marriage. Mrs. Zerenner had been ill for several weeks, and it is thought that death was caused by heart trouble.

Damage Suit Begun. Trial of the suit of George H. Carr, a solicitor, against W. D. Newerf for \$120 damages, on account of personal injuries was begun before Judge Boyd yesterday. Carr says he was struck by Newerf's automobile on Main street, near Temple, October 1, the muscles of his right knee being badly torn.

OSWALD'S VOICE IS NOT HEARD

TELEPHONE IS UNUSED BY REDLIGHT BOSS

REFUSES TO REVEAL HIS HIDING PLACE TO POLICE

Grand Jury Probably Will Make Final Report on Investigation Into Graft Monday and Many Indictments Expected

There was nothing musical in the tinging of the telephone bell in the office of the district attorney's office yesterday and the expectant look on Mr. Fredericks' face as he repeatedly placed the receiver to his ear and was followed by a mental repetition of the old maxim, "Hope deferred maketh the heart sick."

The expected telephone call from Nick Oswald, the missing redlight boss, did not come yesterday, and nothing in regard to his whereabouts could be learned, though the assurances of immunity have not been withdrawn and the reward of \$1000 for his arrest is still set aside in a golden heap in the county treasury, ready to be paid to the man who will reveal Oswald's hiding place.

"Perhaps Oswald would like to arrest himself and accept the reward," was suggested yesterday. "Oswald should be glad to be assured of immunity from punishment," is the stand taken by the district attorney.

By some persons it is believed Oswald has investigated, with the aid of legal eyes, into the waters of the immunity bath and found them to be shallow, in spite of their inviting attractiveness. Still others believe he is being held by individuals and interests who fear his presence as a witness before the special grand jury Monday may result in a mass of indictments being returned.

What effect Oswald's absence Monday will have on the holding of further sessions of the grand jury is problematical, but judging from what already has occurred it is not at all improbable that a final report may be made by the investigators. William Lawrence Fetter, Oswald's associate, was unable to appear in Justice Stephens' court yesterday to be examined on the charge of conspiracy in attempting to evade a grand jury subpoena.

The case was continued until 10 o'clock today at the request of Paul McCormick, deputy district attorney. The hearing of the contempt proceedings in Judge James' court, in which Fetter will be called on to explain his absence from the jury room Tuesday, also was continued. Fetter is still at the county hospital.

Pierre Lamberese, another person wanted as a witness before the grand jury, was arraigned in Justice Stephens' court yesterday on a charge of conspiracy. He was represented by Attorney H. H. Roser, who secured his release on a cash bail of \$100. His examination was set for April 13 at 2 o'clock.

Engross Prohibition Bill. JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 9.—A constitutional amendment providing state-wide prohibition was engrossed by the lower branch of the Missouri legislature this afternoon after it had been amended to become effective Jan. 1, 1913.

The vote was 86 to 45. All the tax riders and amendments and instructions point to the passage of the amendment through the house next Wednesday afternoon, when it will be considered under special order.

The fate of the amendment in the senate is in doubt, but its chances for passage are considered good.

Fears Black Hand. NEW YORK, April 9.—Vincenzo Schiavo de Pape, a wealthy resident of the Bronx, who arrived from Italy tonight with his bride, said he had received letters from the black hand threatening his life because he married his boyhood sweetheart, whom a black hand leader coveted.

Before sailing from Italy with his wife he received letters after the hostility of the black hand would follow him to America.
