

### SCHOOL FOR CHORUS GIRLS IS CONDUCTED FOR VAUDEVILLE ACT

TUITION IS FREE IF WOMEN WILL SIGN CONTRACT

Applicants Must Conform to Instructions and Must Learn Certain Intricacies Demanded by Theatersgoers

School for chorus girls? Who ever heard of such a thing? Most chorus girls are wise enough now, without having to go to school to acquire wisdom.

Yet there are six girls at the Orpheum this week, in the "Laddy Bear" act, who really have gone to school; not only to public and private seminaries of learning open to all their sex,

but to a certain school only for chorus girls, wherein they have learned things to do on the stage—and nothing else. The school for chorus girls was the happy thought of Martin Beck and some of his associates who are interested in giving perfection to the girls acts now so dominant a feature in vaudeville. These acts have been before the public for some years, but usually have been made up of a haphazard lot of girls gathered from other companies and from private life. As a consequence that perfection of unison in acting, singing and dancing so desirable in a condensed act of twenty minutes, where all the attention is riveted on a small group, has been lacking.

It was a combination of all this, with a desire for perfection in girl acts, that led Mr. Beck to form the school for aspirants to vaudeville chorus work. It is in the St. James building, in New York, and instruction is free, contingent upon worthy applicants agreeing to remain with an act for its length of run.

They first go through a series of singing lessons, to perfect them in chorus singing. This is usually the short part of the course, for most girls who apply can sing some at the start. Then come the dancing lessons, which are long and hard. Intricacy of

step is sought; novelty of action is demanded, and variety is necessary. Not only must a girl learn all the usual buck and wing and rag time steps, but she must be able to drop one style of dancing and take up another at a moment's notice without confusing the steps. She is taught to dance, either with hard or soft shoes, in perfect rhythm; she is shown how to caper nimbly in a groove many ways, and she is taught stage deportment; how to "get over the footlights" and all the little tricks that make for popular approval and enjoyment. At the close of her instruction she is qualified to go into a big girl act without much further training, except the usual song and step rehearsals.

The new school, it is reported, is already a success, and will be continued with especial activity during the summer, in anticipation of a number of big girl acts to go out this fall, as these acts have shown a great strength and popularity among vaudeville patrons.

### PLAN TO TELEPHONE WITHOUT WIRES TO BALLOON IN MIDAIR

NOVEL EXPERIMENT WILL BE MADE BY AERO CLUB

Ascension Planned at Springfield, Mass., for Purpose of Testing New Apparatus from High Tower

NEW YORK, April 9.—Experiments with wireless telephones as a means of communication between a balloon in the air and a station on land are soon to be made by A. L. Stevens, the aeronaut. The first tests will be made from the reconstructed balloon Conqueror, which was one of the American contestants in

the international race at Berlin, and which exploded.

The ascension will be made at Springfield, Mass., under the auspices of the Springfield Aero club.

Mr. Stevens will be the pilot and will be accompanied by W. F. Whitehouse of this city and A. H. Morgan of Cleveland.

"Wireless telephone stations will be established at the top of some high building in New York and Boston," said Mr. Stevens, "and we expect to be able to give a detailed account of our trip as we are sailing through the air."

"For long ascensions or balloon races the wireless telephone outfit should be of inestimable value, as it will be possible to keep track of the balloon, and in case of difficulty assistance may be sent quickly."

"For government use in dirigible balloons, the wireless telephone will also be of great aid. In reconnoitering expeditions it would thus be possible to give accurate information of the operation of the enemy in time of war."

### BOYS GUILTY OF BURGLARY REFUSE TO GIVE IDENTITY

One Says He Would Rather Serve Fifteen Years Than Mother Should Learn of Disgrace

Rather than disclose their identity and thus bring disgrace on their relatives, two 17-year-old boys, who had pleaded guilty to burglary charges, told Judge Wilbur yesterday they were ready to spend long terms in the penitentiary.

The boys gave the names of Buster Griffin and Frank Dupre, and investigation by the officers has failed to reveal anything concerning their past life.

"I have a mother—a good woman," said Griffin, "and I would go to prison for the full term of fifteen years rather than let her know of my trouble."

Dupre claimed his stand was taken on account of a sister. Both cases were continued to Monday and the court named Attorney Donald Barker to defend the boys.

### SENTENCES PAROLED MAN TO TEN YEARS AT FOLSOM

Judge Wilbur Recommends Prisoner Be Probated at End of Two Years If Behavior is Good

Harry Elgin, negro, 19 years old, was sentenced to ten years in Folsom penitentiary by Judge Wilbur yesterday. Elgin was released on probation several months ago after being found guilty of burglary. He violated his parole by committing a similar crime.

In sentencing Elgin Judge Wilbur invoked a provision of the new parole law, allowing a judge, in pronouncing sentence, to recommend to the prison authorities the prisoner be paroled after a certain period if his behavior in prison is such as to warrant this action. In Elgin's case he recommended the convict be paroled after two years' service.
