Lacking a stake feature, racing at Santa Anita yesterday afternoon was featured by two handicaps—the Junior for two-year-olds and the Cesarion for the older horses.

Sir Ashton, the odds-on, won the Junior handicap from Donau and Henderson without any great difficulty. Donau gave him an argument into the stretch, but there was no horse race, as Sir Ashton simply breezed to the wire and in fast time.

Probably the sharpshooters got the biggest jolt of the day, and the form players got their best returns, when Lady Irma won the fifth race from Rialto, with Harrigan, the odds-on favorite, third.

Many overlooked the recent good performances of Ida May at a mile and allowed her to win unbacked, but the majority of the long odds laid against her were played by the Chinn following and the stable, and she lasted long enough to win from Rialto by a head in 1:05 1/5.

Lord of the Forest had an easy time winning the second race from Black Mate, breezing in the good thing, and it seemed that he would win when they entered the stretch.

Altenberg won the first race in a bunch of maidens at a mile. Yankee Tourist again was the good thing, and it seemed that he would win when they entered the stretch.

MANAGER FINN ENGAGES P. P. POMEROY TO PRESIDE IN STAND AT SPRING MEET

ANNOUNCEMENT was made last night by Manager W. W. Finn, who will control and direct the destinies of the Utah Jockey club, that he had secured P. P. Pomeroy, now acting as associate judge and clerk of scales at Santa Anita park, as presiding judge at the meeting to be held at Salt Lake City, beginning May 22 and continuing at least for forty days.

It would have been difficult for Manager Finn to have selected a man for this position who would so thoroughly fulfill all the requirements exacted both by the public and the horsemen. Here is one man who has been officially connected with the sport for many years, and yet has never been bothered with any question of honesty, integrity or character, individually or personally, and his selection bears out the statement heretofore made by Manager Finn that the meeting that is to be held in Salt Lake City must be conducted honestly and honorably.

Managers Finn and Secretary Macdonald will leave tomorrow for Salt Lake City to begin preparations for the meeting. Before going, in addition to employing Judge Pomeroy, Manager Finn engaged Judge Charles V. Henderson, who now is paddock judge at Santa Anita park, as paddock judge at the meeting.

Those who intend shipping to Salt Lake City should confer with Judge Pomeroy or the writer at Santa Anita park this week, as the special trains have been ordered and those who desire to ship early will be accommodated.

SAYS ATHLETES RECEIVED MONEY

Representative of Abbot Kinney Company Denies Concern Is Antagonistic to Les Henry of S. C. S. A.

VENICE, April 10.—Mention is made in a Los Angeles paper of this evening regarding the attitude of the Abbot Kinney company toward Les Henry of the Southern California Swimming association, the controversy at present being carried on before the registration committee of the A. A. U.

"The swimming promoter claims the reason the Kinney company is antagonistic to him and turned a business letter over to the newspaper is because he has not seen fit to become a booster for Venice to the detriment of other summer resorts."
Referring to the statement contained therein F. K. McCarver of the Abbot Kinney company, when asked regarding the matter, said: "The Abbot Kinney company is not interested in Mr. Henry's troubles with the A. A. U., and further than being the recipients of a letter from him offering to pull off the swimming championship events at Venice in July last week, I have seen nothing in the newspaper which cannot be considered as being in the matter at all."


