

**ROBBED BY TWO MEN MOUNTED ON WHEELS**

**BICYCLISTS FORCE VICTIM TO ALIGHT FROM VEHICLE**

Bandits Secure \$10, but Overlook a Larger Sum and Gold Watch in Their Haste and Nervousness

Two men mounted on bicycles held up and robbed Joe Reich, proprietor of the Security dye works, 3545 South Park avenue, shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday night on Thirty-seventh street, a short distance from the home of the victim. The robbers obtained \$10 in small change and a pocketknife, but overlooked a larger sum of money and a valuable watch and chain.

Reich was driving his team home, between Central avenue and South Park avenue, two men on bicycles rode toward him. One of the men rode to one side and the other rode to the horses and grasped the bits, at the same time dismounting. The man on the side then drew a revolver and commanded Reich to alight from the wagon and throw up his hands.

As the victim was descending from his seat he drew a wallet containing \$20 from his hip pocket and laid it on the seat. This move was not detected by the highwaymen because of the darkness. The robber who held the victim's head appeared nervous, and after taking the money from the right-hand trousers pocket of the victim ceased his search.

"With a right, Bill, I've got it," the man mounted his wheel and was joined by his companion, who released the horse. The men disappeared in the darkness in the direction of the city.

Reich stated yesterday that one of the men wore a derby hat and the other had on a black slouch hat, pulled over his eyes. The robbers wore dark clothing and were young men.

**WOMAN SAYS NATURE IS GREATEST PANACEA**

**ILLEGITIMATE HEALING KILLS INDIVIDUALITY**

Progressive Life Lecturer Urges the Right Life as Best Cure for Diseases of the Body

Mrs. Stevens prefaced her talk yesterday afternoon at Blanchard Music hall by saying that she wanted it understood that she was not attacking any particular philosophy, religion or personality as such, but that the question of the "right life" is a philosophy is to expose all the errors in any or all of the societies or cults that tend to destroy individuality and rob people of their self-possession.

"It is not only necessary for us," she said, "to teach the necessity of avoiding those feelings and emotions, such as anger, jealousy, desires, etc., which destroy the attitude for growth, namely—calm, still, sweet, serene, happy and contented, alive and wide-awake—but it is also imperative that we point out the more subtle and equally detrimental ideas and methods that lurk in the current metaphysical theories and practices, regardless of their sincerity.

"Illegitimate healing is any method that it ultimately destructive to the individuality and the development of a noble character.

"Very few people have any individuality, and to that extent they do not realize the importance of it. You are subject to influences, and you do not know their source. How many know the difference between their own thoughts and feelings and those which are thrust upon them? Until you can discriminate you are subject to the worst form of slavery that exists, for it lasts for all time. When you are able to discriminate you are free, and not until then.

In answer to the question, "Is it not better to be healed illegitimately than not to be healed at all?" Mrs. Stevens became eloquent in her protestation. "No," she said, "the cost is too great, and the healing is but temporary. But there is a healing," she concluded, "that is legitimate—the one that takes into consideration all three planes, the spiritual, mental and physical. It is the right attitude of the mind toward all things, the right spiritual condition that places you in touch with the highest powers from which help and strength may be drawn, resulting in the promotion of, instead of the loss, of the individuality."

**WINNER OF SIX-DAY RACE IS VEGETARIAN**

German Who Eats No Meat Makes the Best Individual Record. Showed Great Endurance

The exponents of the vegetarian cult are elated over the remarkable showing made by Curt V. Brumbeck, the German vegetarian, in the six-day walking contest which ended last Saturday night.

Brumbeck easily captured the prize for the best individual score and would have been the favorite for team honors had his partner stayed with him during the grueling walk.

Brumbeck's partner walked only one day Monday but the German, spurred on by the offer of an individual prize for the one having the highest total for the week, continued in the race.

The vegetarianism of the big attraction, as the race for team honors was not close, and the Made in California exposition building, where the contest was held, was thronged daily by those who desired to see the husky German in action.

Brumbeck became the favorite by his gentlemanly conduct on the track and his consistent walking. During the six days his score was 230 miles, and his actual walking time 48 hours 15 minutes, or an average of 4 1/2 miles an hour.

**Team Would Have Won**

The total score of the winning team, Wellfare-Morgan, for the six days was 379 miles and 4 laps. It readily may be seen that had Brumbeck's partner stayed with him, the team would have won the contest.

His individual score would also have been bettered, as there would be more at stake and something besides daily to spur him on in his efforts.

During the last two days of the race Brumbeck's feet were a mass of blood blisters, and a leg of a third person could have quit the race, but the vegetarian refused to give up or complain of pain, and was without doubt the strongest of all the walkers in the final Saturday night.

Brumbeck speaks but little English—in fact, is reserved in the conversation of his native tongue, but is full of action. Five years ago he was a person that meat was not beneficial, and since has lived strictly on a vegetarian diet.

During the contest last week the German's principal dishes were peas, carrots, cabbage, beef (via Orange), figs and occasionally a little fruit. Tempting steaks were placed before him the first day of the race, but he surprised all by pushing the dish to one side, and said that vegetables were all that he desired. He never has tasted strong drink of any kind, not even the beer of his fatherland. Brumbeck was born in a peasant's cottage in Frankfurt-on-the-Main, Germany.

**Life Guard at Beach**

He has been in Los Angeles for nearly two years, most of the time as a life guard at Long Beach. He is a perfect specimen of an athlete, stockily built, with well set shoulders and muscles that appears in rugged knots. His endurance is wonderful and "fatigue" is not a word that graces his dictionary. When the rules for the walking contest were drawn up Brumbeck was one of the men who allowed to walk from 10 o'clock in the morning until 10 at night, and insisted that such a method was the only test of the endurance and walking ability of the contestants. The other teams, however, would not agree to such a grueling rule, and it was not allowed.

Despite the sore feet that he expressed regret that the contest was not to last another week, and as he stated in broken English, "Just get warmed up. Walk better now than before."

He attributes his wonderful powers to his vegetable diet, and declares that meat makes men lazy and slothful and that it is "traus mitsch" for him.

**Believed Angeleno Committed Suicide**

Body of John Chanslor, Retired Merchant, Found Floating in Water Off Waikiki Beach, Honolulu

Whether John Chanslor, the retired Los Angeles merchant, who was drowned Saturday at Waikiki beach, Honolulu, in company with an accident of whether he committed suicide is a question that the authorities of Honolulu are unable to determine. Chanslor's body was found floating in the water off Waikiki pier early Saturday morning by a party of natives who were canoeing.

Chanslor left Los Angeles about two weeks ago in company with his son, Joseph Chanslor, president of the Associated Oil companies, and a partner of the firm of Canfield & Chanslor, hardware merchants of Los Angeles. The elder Chanslor had been ill for three years, which caused his retirement from the well-known grocery firm of Anderson & Chanslor, and of late had been suffering with melancholia.

It was for this reason that his physicians advised a trip to Honolulu, his health and physical condition might be improved by a change of climate and scenery. Mr. Chanslor was apparently much improved in health during his brief journey, and Saturday morning the nurse left him asleep in his room at the Moana hotel, Waikiki.

While the attendant was absent, Chanslor awoke, dressed and went out alone, apparently to stroll along the pier. A little later his body was found floating in the water by the natives. No person was found by the authorities who had witnessed the drowning, and owing to Mr. Chanslor's periods of melancholia, the belief is that he planned to end it all and took advantage of the nurse's absence to kill himself.

Mr. Chanslor was one of the foremost figures in the commercial life of Los Angeles, coming from Kansas City, Mo., about twenty years ago. He was associated with Mr. Anderson in the grocery firm which bears their names. He was 65 years old and active in his business until his health compelled his retirement three years ago. He leaves a son, Joseph Chanslor. The body will be cremated and the ashes sent to Los Angeles for burial.

**GATEMAN FOR S. P. RAILROAD FOUND DEAD IN HIS ROOM**

Investigation Reveals Cause of John Lael's Disappearance Since Friday Evening

John Lael, 56 years old, a gateman for the Southern Pacific, was found dead in his room at Banning street last night after noon. The body was lying on a bed and partly dressed. From the appearance of the body it was evidently had been some time before the discovery was made. Heart failure is thought to have caused the death.

Lael stayed in his room the greater part of the time. Occupants of the house last saw him Friday evening. They did not give the matter much thought when he did not appear Saturday. Yesterday a severe storm occurred which missed him and an investigation disclosed his death.

The body was taken to the undertaking establishment of Bross Brothers and the coroner probably will sign a certificate of death without holding an inquest.

**WOMAN WITH LIGHTED LAMP TRIPS; IS DEAD**

Widow Burned by Explosion of Kerosene Dies in the Sisters' Hospital

Mrs. Mary Neelon, a widow who was severely burned at her home, 1016 West Temple street, by the explosion of an oil lamp which she was carrying at 1 o'clock yesterday morning, died at the Sisters' hospital shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday morning. She was 57 years old and is survived by a son.

The accident which resulted in her death occurred while Mrs. Neelon was passing from one room to another carrying a lighted oil lamp. In some manner she tripped over a rug and fell. The lamp flew from her grasp and struck the floor, breaking. An explosion followed immediately and the blazing oil was scattered over her body. She screamed for help and then began to beat out her burning clothing. Before the fire reached her more than half of her body had been burned.

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
