OCCIDENTALS ELECT 1910 TRACK CAPTAIN

FRED THOMAS, ALL AROUND ATHLETE, HONORED

Football Squad Will Be Captained by Arthur Collins, Oxy's Brilliant Open Field Runner—Other Elections

Fred Thomson, Occidental's great all-around athlete, was yesterday afternoon elected track captain for the season of 1910 by his team mates. In addition to this, he was awarded the highest honors the student body of the Presbyterian institution can confer on a member by being elected president for next year, and the vice being Thomson. Thomson is now in his junior year in college, and although large in stature—being 6 feet 2 inches in height and weighing 200 pounds—he is one of the youngest members of his class.

Time and again on the athletic field Thomson has shown his superiority over all comers during the last three years, and this year was the main stay of the track team, winning more than half of the points scored by Oxy in the conference meet on Hayward field last April. His specialties on the path and field are high and low hurdles, shot put, hammer throw, broad jump and high jump, and he is proficient in all of them. On the gridiron he is equally efficient, having played varsity football for the Tigers for three years. He has been catching for the "big league" first team, and could easily make the first team were it not for parental objection.

Arthur Collins was elected football captain for this fall's program, and although he has played on the team for but two years, he has made good with a vengeance during the short time he has been at the Presbyterian institution. He is left handed, and he is particularly a brilliant open field runner, and was the fastest man in the back field last year for the Orange and Black.

Among the other student body officers elected yesterday were Miss Ray Bond, vice president; Miss Alva Gardner, secretary; and Harold Peligren as oratorical representative, all to take office next term.

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
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First Structure Completed at A-Y-P Fair Will House Exhibits of the Manufacturers

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SIXTY INJURED WHEN IRON RAIL GIVES WAY

Crowd at Seattle Presses Against Filmy Barrier to Balcony at Close of Exciting Race in New Armory

SEATTLE, May 7.—None of the sixty persons injured in last night's accident during an athletic meet in the new national guard armory is dead, but the condition of Capt. Maurice W. Thompson, assistant adjutant general of the state of Washington, and his wife is critical.

The armory, a huge building at Virginia street and Western avenue, had just been completed but had not been formally accepted by the state, and was being used for the first time, the occasion being an indoor track meet in the London Olympic games, who last night set a new record for the 50-yard hurdles by running the distance in 54 1/2 seconds. There was great interest when the only guard around the track was drawn to its finish, with F. L. Jackson of Seattle and Ed Crabbe of Portland racing.

The performers distinguished themselves, notably Forrest Smithson of Portland, Ore., the champion hurdler in the London Olympic games, who last night set a new record for the 50-yard hurdles by running the distance in 54 1/2 seconds. There was great interest when the only guard around the track was drawn to its finish, with F. L. Jackson of Seattle and Ed Crabbe of Portland racing.

The center gave way first, but in a fraction of a second the entire section, fifty yards long, went down and scores of the people above fell upon the heads of the crowds below. It is not expected to live, was a member of the junior track team of the Seattle Athletic club, rather than the champion hurdler. Earlier in the evening he had taken part in several events and was dressed in his street clothes and watching at the finish of the race when the collapse came. He was struck on the head with the iron railing and borne down with the human freight that fell with it. He bled so profusely from the mouth that he was for a time unidentified. He was unable to speak.

Y. M. C. A. ATHLETES WILL TRY FOR RECORDS

Fourteen Track and Field Events Are Scheduled, Successful Contestants to Be Rewarded with Valuable Medals

Probably the most interesting event in the coming All-Southern Y. M. C. A. track and field meet, which will be held at Pasadena May 15, will be the high jump. Six state athletes have entered the contest. Four of the men jump six feet or over.

The Crown city Y. M. C. A. will be represented by Robert Merriam, the Pomona college jumper. He has a record of 6 feet 2 inches and holds the national Y. M. C. A. record for this event. Wyman Tyler, who holds the national Y. M. C. A. indoor championship with a record of 5 feet 11 inches, will also be among those present. Sidney Tyler, who formerly held the Southern California interscholastic record, is also entered.

Ventura Y. M. C. A. will be represented by Trotter of U. S. C., who jumps 6 feet; Trotter, formerly of Pomona college, holder of the Pacific coast record of 6 feet 3 1/4 inches, and Alarbit, winner of the Southern California interscholastic high jump at 6 feet 1 inch and winner of the northern interscholastic high jump at 5 feet 10 1/2 inches.

Fourteen track and field events will be run off, also two relay races. The Y. M. C. A. relay race will be one-half mile, and the Throp-Pasadena high school relay, one mile.

The medals for the successful contestants in the meet have been ordered. Silver medals will be given for first place and bronze for second place. The winning team will receive a handsome silk banner, and the winning relay team an oak shield.
