IN the leather-bound edition of his life and career which will be in all probability modeled after the now famous volume of the lightweight champion, Happy Hogan will unquestionably devote a whole chapter to the detailed account of the experiences of Sunday, June 13. Notwithstanding that all the omens of date and circumstance were against him, including the illness of the pet goat and "Spide's" grouch, Happy won the morning game at his own stamping grounds, thereby clinching the series with the Champions. For reasons known to those who are acquainted with the formation of the Vernon team and the resignation of Hogan from his well-beloved Angels to become manager of the Vernons, Happy considers this feat the crowning glory of his career. Today his cup of happiness overfloweth. What matter that he lost the afternoon game, and was almost a shut out? What matter, even, if he should lose today? It has passed into the realms of the impossibilities for Dillon to take away from him the distinction of having taken a series from the pennant men, his rivals of old, wherefore Vernon and its leader wax exceedingly joyful at the thought. The defeat of no other team in the league could have afforded Hap such extreme satisfaction as the trouncing he has given the Seraphic ones.

Two home runs practically won for Vernon in the morning game, and had it not been for these long hits Hap probably would have been on the short end in both contests. Eagan and Martinke were responsible for the circuit in hits, the former scoring himself in the second inning and Martinke brought in Stovall and Brashear ahead of him with a long, high fly over the fence. In the fourth, on a single, a steal and two sacrifices Eagan crossed the plate for the second time in the game, and this was all for the Vernons. CLOSE RACE IN REVOLVER SHOOT

WRIGHT WINS GOLD MEDAL BY NARROW MARGIN

Excellent Scores Are Made by Members of Los Angeles Revolver Club in Contest for Hoegee Handicap and Pistol Trophies

INTERESTING COMPETITION IS HELD ON RANGE

The regular monthly medal shoot for the Hoegee handicap and pistol medals was held yesterday by members of the Los Angeles Revolver club on the Bishop street range and some excellent scores were made with both revolver and pistol.

The revolver scores were better than the pistol scores, which is not generally the case, as the pistol is capable of making closer groups than the revolver. In the revolver medal contest Will A. Wright and L. C. Douglas were in a close race for first place, but at the finish Wright was one point ahead of Douglas, so was awarded the medal. In his first ten-shot string Douglas made a score of 27, but as Dr. Packard had the least number of low shots he was awarded the medal.

After the medal contests a number of the members shot on the international revolver and pistol target. This target was used at Bisley, England, at the world championship last year. The bulls-eye, which is seven and seven-eighths inches across, contains the 7, 3, 9 and 10 rings, which are about one inch apart, the 10 ring being a little less than two inches in diameter.

A score of 78 on this target would be equivalent to a score of 85 on the standard American target. This target will very likely be adopted by the United States Revolver association and used throughout the country instead of the standard American target. The contest concerning the revolver match between the local club and the Smith & Wesson Pistol and Revolver club, the local club, Mass., the local club winning the contest by 87 points. FRENCH CLASSIC AT CHANTILLY GOES TO NEGOFOL

BLANC'S UNION RUNS THIRD IN THREE-YEAR-OLD EVENT

PARIS, June 13.—The French Derby was run today at Chantilly and was won by W. K. Vanderbilt's Negofol in impressive style from Edmond Blanc's Union, with Negofol's stable companion Oversight, third. The stake was worth \$40,600, and the race was witnessed by an immense crowd, including thousands of Americans, who won heavily on the American victory.

The French Derby is a 3-year-old event at a mile and a half. Last year W. K. Vanderbilt's Seaside II ran a dead heat with M. Deschamps Quintette II, and in 1906 Mr. Vanderbilt's Maintenance won the stake.

Today Negofol was sent out in front and made all the running to the stretch when Negofol, closely attended by Union, came through and won in a drive.

W. K. Vanderbilt's Seaside II won the Prix de Dangu at two and a half miles, stake \$2000.

CITRUS BELT LEAGUE ARRANGES SCHEDULE

REDLANDS, June 13.—All schedules for athletes in the Citrus Belt High School league for next season have been made out.
