PLUCKING BOARD RETIRES OFFICERS

NINE NAVAL NOTABLES ARE SHELVED UNDER PERSONNEL ACT SPERRY COMMITTEE MOVES

Four Captains, One Commander and Three Lieutenant Commanders Are Raised One Grade and Sent Into Private Life

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, July 2.—Five captains, one commander and three lieutenant commanders of the navy, the selection of the Sperry "plucking board," were retired today under the navy personnel act, after approval by President Taft. They include Capt. Edward F. Qualtrough, who was commander of the battleship Georgia during the trip around the world of the Atlantic battleships, and who was suspended from duty for six months following court-martial at Tangier on charges of intoxication and unbecoming conduct. The other officers retired are: Captains Dennis H. Mahan, commandant of the Puget sound navy yard, Bremerton, Wash.; Alex. McCrackin, commander of the cruiser West Virginia; J. B. Collins, commander of the battleship Indiana, and commandant of the Philadelphia navy yard, and W. S. Hogg, former commander of the supply ship Glacier; Commander Leo D. Miner, inspector of machinery at Mare Island navy yard; Lieutenant Commander Glennie Tarbox, who has been under treatment at the navy hospital at Mare Island; William W. Bush, in charge of the navy recruiting station at Oklahoma City; and Charles T. Jewell, executive officer of the cruiser Chattanooga.

VACANCIES CREATED

The captains are retired with the rank of commodore, the commanders with the rank of captain and the lieutenant commanders with the rank of commander. These retirements create the forty vacancies above the grade of junior lieutenant, required each year by law. The voluntary retirements increased the number of vacancies made by deaths, resignations and other causes, to thirty-one, making necessary the choosing of the officers for compulsory retirement. By the retirements William S. Benson becomes senior commander, Frank Marble senior lieutenant commander and Luther M. Overstreet senior lieutenant of the navy.

MICHIGAN'S TREASURY IS NOW ALMOST EXHAUSTED

State Faces Six Months of Close Financing—Institutions Will Be Run on Credit LANSING, Mich., July 2.—The state of Michigan faces six months of financial stringency owing to the condition of the state treasury. Only \$300,784 remained in the general fund at the opening of the fiscal year yesterday, and during the day \$130,000 of this amount was paid out. The next taxes are not expected to come in before the first of next year, and state officials are trying to find some way to bridge over the intervening six months. It is expected that arrangements will be made by some of the state institutions to get their supplies on credit until the first of the year.

LIEUT. COL. A. S. B. KEYES DIES IN SAN DIEGO HOME

Throat Affection Proves Fatal—Large Family Left to Mourn Deceased Veteran Officer

SAN DIEGO, July 2.—Lieutenant Colonel Alexander S. B. Keyes, U. S. A., retired, aged 63, died at his home in this city this morning as the result of an affection of the throat. He leaves a wife, Mrs. Virginia Keyes, and daughters, Ethel Keyes, Mrs. Howard Keyes, Mrs. Chihuahua, Mex. Mrs. Fiske, wife of Captain H. D. Fiske; and sons, Lieutenant E. A. Keyes, stationed in the Philippines and Geoffrey Keyes, U. S. A. cadet. The remains will be shipped to San Francisco for interment.

FIRE IN CHINESE QUARTER SPREADS; LOSS IS HEAVY

3000 People Rendered Homeless as a Result and Feeling Against Orientals Runs High

COBALT, Ont., July 2.—Fire which broke out early today in the restaurant of a Chinese on Halleybury road caused a loss estimated at \$100,000. There is strong feeling against the Chinese, in whose section the fire started. Three thousand people have been rendered homeless and the entire business section north of the square has been destroyed. One man was killed and three persons are missing. Six persons were injured.

MISSISSIPPI MUCKRACKING

JACKSON, Miss., July 2.—Charging that the Texas company and the Gulf Refining company, Texas corporations, are subsidiary branches of the Standard Oil company, that both have violated the anti-trust laws of Mississippi, and asking for penalties aggregating \$11,000,000 and perpetual injunctions restraining the concern from further operations in this commonwealth, proceedings were filed today in the chancery court of Harrison county.

SAN LUIS POTOSI, Mexico, July 2.—Advices from Raton state that while making firecrackers Francisco Martinez accidentally ignited the powder with the ashes of his cigarette, causing an explosion which burned the house and cremated his two infant children.

FORTY BURIED ALIVE

NEWPORT, Monmouthshire, Eng., July 2.—A landslide occurred here today at the works connected with the new docks as a result forty men were buried alive. The first reports of the casualties placed the number at 100 men.

Some of his fellow students taunted Dhinagri, who threatened to cut the throat of one of his most active tormentors. He was a hard working student. It appears that he and Lieutenant Colonel Wylie had met once previous to the tragedy of last night. Dhinagri's brother who is a doctor in Calcutta, hearing of his association with the political extremists in India, wrote to Colonel Wylie, asking him to try to influence the student. Wylie saw Dhinagri, but the interview appears only to have embittered the young man, who nursed his resentment pending a favorable opportunity for revenge.

MENNONITE COLONY WILL HAVE 150 PUMPING PLANTS Desire for Hasty Delivery of Water Leads to Wholesale Order for Machinery

BAKERSFIELD, July 2.—Estimates are being received here by Henry J. Martens, who is to place from 5000 to 20,000 Mennonites in a colony on lands already purchased northwest of this city, for the installation of 150 pumping plants to supply the colony with water. These plants will cost in the aggregate \$500,000, and some of the wells will be equipped with pumps by early fall. Martens declares that the contracts for the entire number of pumps will be closed in the near future and that wholesale drilling of wells will make possible the establishment of a water system within a year.

IMPROVEMENT IN FINANCES REWARDS COLLECTOR LOEB Revenues Reported by New York Customs House Show Marked Increase Since Shakeup

NEW YORK, July 2.—An improvement in the finances of the customs house at this port is shown in the report of Collector Loeb, and indicates that the recent shaking up given his department has been a success. The duties collected on passengers' baggage for June were \$22,908, the largest in history for that month. Heretofore the duties on baggage during June averaged \$50,000 to \$60,000. The receipts from customs fines, penalties and forfeitures for June, 1909, were \$45,764.83, as compared with \$5,468.88 for June, 1908. The report shows that customs inspectors are going through the baggage of incoming passengers with a fine tooth comb.
