

VETERANS READY FOR CONVENTION

SPANISH WAR MEN ARRIVE FOR ENCAMPMENT

FIGHT EXPECTED OVER CHOICE OF COMMANDER

P. C. MULQUEENY IS ONLY CANDIDATE SO FAR ADVANCED—OPPOSITION MAY PUT FORWARD CAPTAIN DIXON OF LOS ANGELES

[Special to The Herald.] PASADENA, Aug. 29.—Delegates from all over the state arrived in this city today to attend the annual encampment of the United Spanish War veterans of California, which begins tomorrow and will last three days.

There is talk of naming Capt. Dixon of the Los Angeles police department as the compromise candidate. The anti-Mulqueeny people expect to make their fight in the convention on the face that this man's candidacy is advocated by the people who are behind Abe Ruef in the state, and they declare his election will mean the entering into politics of the veterans.

The fight, according to the leaders of the opposition, is to be made on points of honor grounds, and they expect that, rather than have this enter into the campaign, Mulqueeny will withdraw his name from the list and leave the election open to the favorite sons and dark horses who are scheduled to come before the encampment.

Of these there will be enough and to spare, although the delegates from the southern half of the state are confident they will be able to elect one of their number. Headquarters for the Los Angeles candidates were opened today in the Hotel Guadalupe, where the department headquarters are located, and the work of pleading the candidates' case forwardly and the day of the election, which will probably be Wednesday, although the more optimistic members of the encampment are hoping the election will come on Tuesday.

BAY CITY ATTORNEY KILLS HIMSELF; ILL HEALTH CAUSE

Brother-in-Law of Unfortunate Man Calls at Office Adjoining Relative Just Before Deed

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—Louis Hirsch, an attorney, committed suicide today by firing a bullet into his brain while despondent because of ill health. Just before the deed was done, Michael Savannah, a brother-in-law of the man, called at an office adjoining that occupied by Hirsch to make inquiries about his relative's whereabouts. He said that Hirsch had been absent from home for some time and that his relatives were worried. Savannah was hardly out of the building before Hirsch killed himself.

Chauffeur Dies of Injuries

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Laurent Grosse, driver of the Stearns car, who was injured in the twenty-four-hour automobile race at the Brighton Beach motorhome Friday night, died today. Leonard Cole, his mechanic, was instantly killed in the accident. Grosse's back was broken. He was 29 years old and lived in New York.

WOMAN LOSES LIFE IN FIRE

MRS. JOSEPH RONONG BURNED TO DEATH AT WILMINGTON

HUSBAND AND SON INJURED IN FIERCE FLAMES

Catastrophe Supposed to Have Been Caused by Gasoline Stove Explosion While Housewife Was Preparing Dinner

[Special to The Herald.] SAN PEDRO, Aug. 29.—A fatal fire occurred at Wilmington at 11:30 o'clock this morning. One woman was burned to death and her husband and son were seriously injured. The dead, Mrs. JOSEPH RONONG, Wilmington apartments, Seventh street.

The fire started in the kitchen of the Ronong apartments in the Wilmington apartment building, Seventh street, Wilmington, about 11:30 o'clock. It is supposed that Mrs. Ronong was preparing the Sunday dinner over a gasolene stove. It is believed that the blazing distillate was spilled over the woman and the kitchen walls, for the place was instantly a mass of flames.

Mrs. Ronong was so seriously burned that she died in a few minutes. Her husband, after the fire started, rushed back into the house to retrieve the child who was severely burned that death may result.

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CURTISS WINS ANOTHER EVENT

ADDS PRIX DE LA VITESSE TO LAURELS

HISTORY MAKING AERONAUTICAL WEEK ENDS

America's Representative Takes Lion's Share of Honors in Most Remarkable Aviation Carnival—Countrymen Urges Medal

[By Associated Press.] BETHENY, Aviation Field, Rheims, Aug. 29.—A twilight vision of Paulhan's graceful monoplane, like a great white bird soaring above the plains this evening so high that it seems to rise above the harvest moon, over the distant hills and the fleeting "golden fier," as the Curtiss machine has been dubbed, lowering another world's record in the Prix de la Vitesse, were the closing glories of aviation week.

The victory of Glenn H. Curtiss, the sole American representative in the contests, coming on the heels of his great victory in the international cup yesterday, giving the United States the lion's share of the honors. The Prix de la Vitesse, of 20,000 francs (\$4000), divided into four prizes, was distributed to the four machines, making three rounds of the course, thirty kilometers, at the greatest speed, the first prize being won by Curtiss, notwithstanding his penalization.

CELEBRATES BIRTH SURPRISED BY MAID

GOLDEN JUBILEE IS OCCASION FOR HOLIDAY

WOMAN'S SCREAMS SUMMON POLICE

Long Parade, Files Through City's Streets and Marchers Go to Shellmound Park for Day's Pleasure

Frightened by Giving of Alarm, Daring Thieves Decamp, Abandoning All but Trifling Amount of Loot

[Special to The Herald.] LONG BEACH, Aug. 29.—When a maid employed by Mrs. Jean Drake of Third street and Cedar avenue entered the house about 9 o'clock tonight, she surprised two burglars at work.

The men had broken open the rear door and had completely ransacked the place, evidently being about ready to gather up the loot and depart. When they saw the young woman they ran out the back door and escaped, taking with them jewelry valued at about \$5 and a few articles of clothing.

The maid rushed out the front door and summoned the police by her screams. They are now looking for the burglars, although the girl could give no adequate description of them.

ESTIMATE 1200 ARE DROWNED

(Continued from Page One) all last night and until late today, when a line was restored.

Hundreds of telegrams have been passing through here to Monterey today requesting information as to the fate of friends and relatives. Communication has been established through a circuitous route and telegrams are being answered as rapidly as possible. Their import is "Don't worry, 'Am safe." "All well, but many lives lost yesterday."

Some of the telegrams report the drowning of entire families, missing fathers, mothers, children and relatives.

The bodies as fast as recovered are placed along the banks of the river on the higher ground to await identification. The bodies are guarded by soldiers, who escort any searcher for a missing friend or relative along the long lines of dead. Arrangements likely will be made tomorrow to bury the dead.

It is estimated the river has risen fifty or sixty feet. It is understood that an appeal for aid has gone out from Monterey. One statement is that Consul-General Hanna has appealed to the authorities at Washington requesting that a general appeal be made by the federal government.

The consul is said to have made this appeal in the name of the American colony of Monterey.

Wrestler Drowns as Wife Watches

Mounted Policeman Makes Daring Attempt at Rescue, but Unfortunately is Lost in Sight of Family

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—In sight of his wife and baby, Earl Lindner, aged 21, recently from Minneapolis, where he had some renown as a wrestler, was swept from his feet in the surf near the Cliff house and drowned today despite the efforts at rescue by mounted patrolman Edward Dudgeon.

Mounted patrolman Edward Dudgeon, who rode his horse far out into the surf and sought to lasso the man caught in the undertow.

Just as the patrolman came within twenty feet Lindner's head and shoulders had been recovered. Lindner and his wife came here from Minneapolis three weeks ago to visit her brother, Henry Ames.

Drops Dead at Table

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 29.—George B. Katzenstein, manager of the Earl Fruit company in this city, died suddenly today. He was dining at his home, and was found by his family, when his head drooped, he gasped once and expired without a struggle. He was a native of Louisiana, 60 years of age and leaves a widow and three grown sons. He belonged to many fraternal orders.

One Killed, One Fatally Hurt

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—One man was killed, one fatally injured and four persons badly bruised tonight when an electric car on the upper Albine line struck a wagon containing a party of picnickers on Williams avenue. The dead is William Barker, an engraver, and the fatally injured is William Brandt, driver.

Disastrous Fire Reported

SEATTLE, Aug. 29.—One life was lost, ten houses were burned and a block of buildings on Western avenue, between University and Seneca streets, was wiped out in a fire that threatened the wholesale district this morning.
