ELLEN BEACH YAW will appear in concert at Simpson auditorium Tuesday night under the auspices of the Pico Heights Congregational church and will be assisted by Miss Grace Adelle Freebey, pianist; C. M. Chapin, violinist, and Mrs. T. Newman and Sybby G. Pease, accompanists.

A special program has been arranged for the occasion and Mme. Yaw will sing for the first time a song entitled "Some Birds," the words of which were written by Master George Francis, Jr., aged 7, with music by Freebey. This song was brought to the attention of Mme. Yaw last week, who considers it so remarkable a production for so youthful a composer and the music so delightful that she has not only added it to her program for next Tuesday night, at which time Miss Freebey will accompany her, but has resolved to add it to her repertoire and sing it on tour.

Another song which Mme. Yaw will sing for the first time Tuesday night is "May Day," the words of which were composed by John Wilcox in the year 1864. The music is Miss Freebey's. 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
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
